

THURSDAY, proceed to Corfield's Hotel, Blackstock, night.

FRIDAY, proceed to F. Robbins', Enniskillen, noon; thence to his own stable, where he will remain ti!! the following Monday morning.

The above route will be continued during the season, health and weather permitting.

DESCRIPTION.

JUBILEE CHIEF (2122) is a horse of beautiful symmetry, strongly built, with grand feet and legs and fine muscular development, accompanied with high and easy action. He stands 15 hands 3 inches in height, weighs about 1300 lbs. He is a horse of fine temper and a sure foal getter. He won first prize at the Industrial Show in Toronto, 1891, 1892 and 1893, where he was greatly admired; also first at the Toronto Spring Stallion Show 1893. At the World's Fair, Chicago, in 1893, he won the World's Championship, and also the Gold Medal given by the English Hackney Society, against a large field of imported hackneys. He also won the first prize four times in succession for best Hackney Stallion and three of his get at the Industrial Exhibition and the Canadian Horse Show in Toronto, 1896. His son Banquo won first prize at the Great Horse Show, at Madison Square Garden, New York City, in two-year-old class, competing with a large class of Imported and American Colts. His daughter Jessica won the Sweepstakes two years in succession at the Canadian Horse Show in Toronto, competing with mares three-years-old and under. Maplewood Chief, another of his colts, gained first prize at Philadelphia Horse Show, in a large class sired by the most celebrated horses in America. These winnings prove Jubilee Chief to be one of the best Hackney Sires on this Continent.
