

beginning of March last, Captain Mayne, Ensign Pierce, and one Bliss, a private, all of the Queen's Rangers, in passing a river on the ice, which giving way, they fell in, the Captain and Bliss were fortunate enough to get out, but Mr. Pierce perished; a few days after his body was taken up and interred. Bliss soon perished by the severity of the weather."

Another subject that should be worked up in connection with Amherstburg is a connected account of the various regiments or companies stationed there; for instance, from a list of the subscribers to the Wolfe and Montcalm Monument at Quebec I find that the following officers at Amherstburg subscribed one pound each in 1828: Capt. North, 68th Regt.; Ensigns McLean and North; Dep.-Asst.-Com.-Gens. Baily, Stanton, and Blackburn; Asst. Surgeon Dr. Huston, Barrack Master Duff; also George Ironside, Supt. Indian Dept., and Dr. Richardson, of the Indian Dept. In 1839 the 34th Regt. of Foot was stationed at the Fort.
