Stallings sent two left-handed hitters against Kelley's array of left-handed hitters. Big Ott Hoes opened for the Braves, and was succeeded by Paul Stran, the schoolboy out-puncher bought by Boston from Spokane. Stran, who was the only twirler to put much effort into his pitching, showed a corking curve ball. He struck out Herbert, Shaw and O'Hara in the eighth inning. Maxwell and Rudolph used nothing but speed. Herbert tried a change of pace and acquitted himself most creditably when in trying position. Kelley was aided by the line work of the lad from the Ottawa team. Bradley hit two of the long drives ever seen on the local park. Left-hander Jackson played for Bradley both times and succeeded in holding out of the wallop to two bases, while the other he caught and converted into a double-play, just when Toronto threatened to tie the score.
