Card at Motorcycle

EXHIBITION GROUNDS, July 26.—Long after the first event was called, the crowd continued to line into the big stand at the Ontario Motorcycle championships, under C.M.A. sanction, held this afternoon. With the track in excellent shape, and a good guard of view, the meet was a decided success. Joe Baribeau and Ernie McIntosh of Toronto, who were posed by Van Almkirk of Rochester, and Geo. McGee, in the professional events, while the amateur races brought out the popular Bobby Scott, Alex Duff, the new amateur champion, O. Murray and G. Bowden of Hamilton. A Thorpe and B. Johnson of Toronto, who included many local riders of prominence.

G. Hendley was first to finish in the three-mile novice championship. Joe Baribeau was easily the best in the professional races, and rode like the champion he is. The Irishmen never left any doubt as to the result of the match after they had piled up a lead of five goals in the opening session, and increased it as they went along. The visitors were played off their feet in the first two quarters, but came back in the third, making a determined effort to overtake the long lead against them. The task was a hopeless one, and although they scored four goals to the Irishmen's single count, it made little difference.
