downment for educational purposes, and especially for university extensions and technical education. RANCHING COMMERCIALISM. Considerable difference of opinion exists among members of the deputation as to what policy should be adopted by the government respecting the ranching situation, and this difference, it is understood, is reflected to some extent in the Dominion cabinet. Hon. Dr. Roche, minister of the interior, is quoted as standing by the report recently made by the ranching commission which declared that the cattle industry of Alberta could only be preserved by maintaining and even enlarging the big ranching reservations. Hon. Mr. Rogers on the other hand, is said to be in favor of the establishment of small communal ranching reservations for the benefit of homesteaders, who would be allowed to graze a certain number of cattle upon the same. The visiting Albertans are not agreed as to which would be the better policy, but the majority of them favor breaking up the big ranches, claiming that they give an undue preference to the packer. The encouragement of the dead meat industry by the establishment and operation of abattoirs under federal control will also be advocated.

Wheat Tariff Cut. In addition to the removal of the wheat and flour duties the visiting Conservative statesmen from Alberta will ask for reductions in various staples, including cement and agricultural implements. It is not likely that any of these requests for tariff reductions will receive anything more than a promise of favorable consideration when the general revision of the tariff is taken up at a later date. Indeed, it is more than suspected that the visit to Ottawa is for the purpose of placating local sentiment as far as possible without antagonizing or even seriously embarrassing the Dominion Government. The delegates, however, will remain here until after the opening of parliament and expect to talk over the western situation with the Conservative members from Ontario and the other provinces before leaving the capital.

HOUSEWIVES' UNION IS URGENTLY NEEDED. Women Do Great Bulk of Spending, Boycott Heroine Points Out.

MONTREAL, Jan. 12.—(Can. Press.)—The foundation of a Housewives' League in Montreal, and agitation for the appointment of women food inspectors, was urged before the Woman's Club today by Mrs. Julian Heath, president of the Housewives' League of New York, and heroine of several successful boycotts of fancy priced foodstuffs.

"Economists have calculated," said Mrs. Heath, "that three-quarters of the wealth of the world is spent by the women. It is our duty to spend it wisely. Housekeeping must be looked upon as a real profession and it must be put upon a business basis. A great deal of the blame for the high cost of living rests upon us, men is the natural producer and woman the natural administrator of the country. I believe if half the men ran their business as we do our householding the whole country would be bankrupt."
