In the imperial conference in June, Britain will abrogate these in so far as they concern Canada." It has taken The Star a long time to concoct this misrepresentation, for misrepresenta-

tion it certainly is. At the session of the imperial conference held on June 16, Sir Wilfrid

Laurier moved that the imperial government be requested to open negotiations with the several foreign governments having treaties which apply to the overseas dominions, with a view to securing the liberty for any of these dominions, which may so desire, to withdraw from the operation of a treaty without impairing the treaty in espect to the rest of the empire.

The motion was afterwards amended by inserting the word "commercial" before treatles, and was accepted by Sir Edward Grey on behalf of the imperial government, subject to the understanding that it agreed to open negotiations with the countries concerned and to ask whether they would be prepared to modify their treaties in the direction desired. "If they agreed." he quite simple, but if they did not, the best course of procedure would be to enter upon negotiations for new treaties, without denouncing those now in existence. 
