NEWS BY WIRELESS TO MAGDALEN ISLANDS

Main Doings of Wreck to Be Read to People From Pulpits on Sunday.

OTTAWA, Feb. 20.—(Special.)—Hon. L. P. Pelletier, postmaster-general, made the announcement to-night that the government has arranged to give a weekly one news service by Marconi gram to the Magdalen Islands, which have hitherto been isolated six months in the year.

Every Saturday there will be sent a thousand words from the station at Picotet to the islands, containing the main news of the week. This will be read to the people Sunday morning from the pulpits. The cost will be \$450 per year.

CROP OF COMMISSIONERS

Five Vacant Trade Agencies to Be Filled—Thore Reorganization Coming.

OTTAWA, Feb. 20.—(Special.)—It is understood that as soon as the grain bill is disposed of, Hon. Geo. E. Foster intends to take up the question of the reorganization of the Canadian trade commission system. There will be a complete reorganization of the work and a re-allocation of territory.

There are no less than five vacant positions which have been held open until the minister of trade and commerce has time to make a systematic study of the question. The positions vacant are Berlin, Paris, Shanghai, Havana and Vienna.

These vacant positions will be filled, while a number of new appointments are expected at strategic trade posts.

It is the intention of the ministers to make the commission system more useful to Canadian exporters in the past. They will act as sort of Canadian vice-consuls.

LA PATRIE HAS FRESH BRAIN-STORM.

MONTREAL, Feb. 20.—(Special.)—La Patrie has a very violent attack upon the minister of justice this evening, alleging that Hon. C. J. Roberty declared that Sir Rodolphe Forget had not got enough.

NEED MORE LAND

One Hundred Acres to Be Added to Farm at Guelph.

A supplementary estimate of \$10,000 for the purchase of an additional 100 acres for the experimental farm at Guelph will likely be passed at the present session of the legislature. The work of the Agricultural College has been expanding so much of late, and the number of students increasing to such an extent, that additional land has been deemed a necessity.
