CORN HOLDS FIRM DROPPING TO STORM

Arrivals of Grain Small at Chicago, Because of Train Blockade.

Chicago, Jan. 7.—Storm conditions affecting the railroads tended today to uphold the corn market. Prices closed steady, at the same as Saturday's finish to 1/4c off, with January \$1.27 1/2 and May \$1.25 1/2. Oats gained 1/4c to 1/2c, and provisions 1/4c to 1/2c.

Corn prices hardened a little, at times as a result of the fact that owing to train blockades, the arrivals of corn here showed a much smaller total than had been looked for.

However, that a material quickening of the crop movement on spot for 1918 was delayed, and there were numerous reports that empty cars were being furnished freely to rail shippers.

A further handicap to bulls was the knowledge that to comply with a provision of the food administration, the board of trade directors had refused to disturb the present maximum price limit on future deliveries.

Under such circumstances any decided show of strength was out of the question, but on the other hand, the market proved stubborn against the least important decline.
