This makes the fourth murder that the notorious Indian has committed in twenty-four years.

FROM HALIFAX TO GALWAY.

London, June 19.—In a column letter to "The Dundee Advertiser" Robert Reford, the Montreal vesselman, advocates the distance of only 350 miles between Liverpool and New York.

No Quorum.

Ottawa, June 19.—The special committee on Mr. Aitken's bill to put extra companies under the jurisdiction of the railway commission failed to get a quorum this morning and adjourned till Thursday. Sir Frederick Borden, Hon. Mr. Emmerson, Mr. Aitken and Mr. Pringle were the only members who turned up.

Crimean Veteran Dead.
Montreal, June 19.—A veteran of the Crimean and the Fenian raid, William Kearns, died today, aged 72. He was a native of County Down, Ireland.

NO EVIDENCE YET TO SHOW CITY INTENDS TO BREAK AWAY

Street Railway Co. Fails to Secure Injunction re Barton Avenue Car Barn Site.

The Toronto Street Railway Company have lost the action to prevent the city expropriating the lot on Barton-avenue, which the company bought originally for a car barn site, but which the city afterwards determined to acquire in order to do a good turn to the congregation of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, which adjoins the place. The following judgment, delivered by Chief Justice Meredith, is, however, confined to a declaration that there is nothing to show that the city has taken proceedings to expropriate, hence there is nothing to stop.

"There is no evidence," Sir William finds, "to justify the court in restraining the city from passing the by-law, even if the company be right in its contention that the lands in question cannot be compulsorily taken."

"What right have I to assume that the council will do an illegal act? For all that appears, the council will be properly advised and will refrain from passing an illegal by-law, but if it should not, what harm will be done? The by-law, if illegal, may be quashed, and if ultra vires, will, I apprehend, even be quashed, give no authority to the defendant corporation to take the lands or interfere with the plaintiff company's possession of them."

"I am far from thinking," says the chief justice, "that the fact, if it were the fact, that the council, having under consideration the providing of a park in a particular section of the city, was induced to reject a site which it had under consideration and to choose another because that other buildings of a character not desirable for a residential section were about to be put up, would afford any ground for the interference by the court with the decision which the legislature has vested in the council and not in the court, and that the court ought not to, and cannot properly interfere with, control or supersede unless the council is not in good faith exercising its powers, but using them to serve an ulterior purpose which it could not directly accomplish lawfully."

Sir William does not deem it necessary to consider the company's contention that as railway property the lands in question were devoted to a public use and so could not be expropriated, under the powers conferred upon the municipalities by the legislature.

He adds that the by-law, "if passed and ultra vires could do no harm to the plaintiffs, even though it were not quashed, for it would be a mere waste of paper."

The railway will have to pay the costs.

EDUCATION BILL.

Agreement Reached to Close Debate Within 15 Days.

London, June 19.—After a heated debate lasting from early yesterday afternoon till 2.30 this morning, the house of commons, having voted down numerous amendments offered by the opposition, adopted a resolution offered by Mr. Campbell-Bannerman with a view to expediting the progress of the education bill. The government's majority was 115. The resolution empowered the government to close the bill for the remaining stages of the bill.

DEFEAT BRITISH ARMY

London.—England is at last giving serious attention to the balloon as a practical adjunct to the army. Twenty thousand men, constituting the Aldershot Army Corps, have been conducting a sham battle over the Surrey Hills and the Hampshire Heath, and the balloon section was brought into action under the King's personal observation.

Brigadier-General Alderson held the Chobham ridges with 3000 infantry, consisting of 12,000 foot guards and a brigade of cavalry under General Paget. With Paget also were eighty guns and the balloon section.

It was Paget's object to discover the entrenched rear guard and the masked batteries, and in order to do so he sent up three balloons. Their aerial spying was completely successful. The protecting force was discovered, and a terrific bombardment of the entrenched infantry and hidden guns was made.

When the balloons came down, the force of the foot guards and a flank charge by the invader's cavalry. The rear guard was dislodged, the masked batteries silenced and the rear guard was ignominiously routed.

It was the consensus of military opinion that the victory of the invaders was largely aided by the use of balloons, and the King remarked that it was a lesson that the war office would do well to take to heart.

THREATENED TO BURN

AS AN ACT OF REVENGE

Brookville, June 19.—(Special.)—A strapping young man named Daniel Henry, of Prescott, was arraigned today for threatening to burn the plant of the fulminate of mercury works owned by Prescott.

The trouble arose over employment of non-union labor. Henry and other employees were laid off during a slack period, and when they were resumed he was not taken on.

DIES AFTER HEARTY MEAL.

Brookville, June 19.—(Special.)—After eating a hearty meal, which he seemed to relish, James Easter, an elderly citizen, fell from the chair at the home of his brother-to-day and suddenly expired. Yesterday he left the hospital, where he had been receiving treatment for a fortnight. He was 63 years of age.

More Than He Bargained For.

A man in Paris, who had an ugly wife, bribed his groom to run away with her, so that he could get a divorce. The groom did so, but took with him all the woman's jewels and several thousand pounds of the husband's money.
