### MYSTERY OF DESERTION IN SYNAGOGUE CLEARED

Berlin Doctor Writes Chief Coroner Johnson of Father's Hunt for Jewish Cemetery.

The mystery surrounding the leaving of the body of an infant at the Jewish Synagogue on the night of Sept. 5 is cleared up by a letter from Dr. F. H. Kalbfleisch of Berlin, who issued the death certificate, which was found with the body in the shoebox with the child.

The doctor says that the difference in the sex of the child found and that for which the certificate was issued was a slip of the pen, and sets out the father's explanation of the strange occurrence.

He says that it was the father who left the child in the church, and that he brought it to the city because there was no Jewish cemetery in Berlin. The father says that the man whom he saw tried to extort money from him for the burial.

It appears that this man was Solomon Clayman, 46 Nelson-street, as he explains it "Boss of the McCaul-street Synagogue Burying Ground."

His story of what happened is this: "About 9:30 on the night of Sept. 5 a man came to my house with Rabbi Solway. The man had the dead child in the box and wanted me to bury it. I told him I could not do that, but he said he had no money, so I told him to come round in the morning and I would see what could be done.

"He said the rabbi's son, who lived in Berlin, said the synagogue would see that the child was buried, and sent him to his father.

"He went away and I did not see him again, till I searched for him the next day. Then I heard that he had left the child in the Chestnut-street Synagogue, with which I have no connection."

Dr. Kalbfleisch's explanation to the chief coroner is much the same. He had it from Birtman, the father. It follows:

"There is no Jewish cemetery here. His Jewish friends suggested that he was to take it to Toronto. He looked up the caretaker of the synagogue and told him he had a dead infant and came from Berlin.

"The caretaker first asked \$15, and then came down to \$10. Mr. Birtman having no money, the caretaker would have nothing to do with it. Mr. Birtman wanted then to stay over night and see the president of the synagogue in the morning. He went and found out where the synagogue was. It was lit up, and he left his dead infant there and hurried to the depot and took the night train for Berlin. This is his story, and I consider it a correct one."

### TRIO OF HEAVY BURGLARS BLOW ROYAL BANK VAULT

Scared Off by Young Men They Flew, Firing on Their Pursuers.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Sept. 10.—A trio of safe-blowers made a raid on the Chippewa branch of the Royal Bank about 2:30 this morning.

Gaining an entrance by prying open the side window and knocking off the combination handle of the safe they inserted dynamite and blew the fireproof door from its fastenings, securing about \$20 in silver and copper deposited inside the fireproof door. The bank's money on hand was in the burglar-proof lock inside the safe, but no doubt the trio were scared off before being able to make an attempt to get it by a couple of young men coming home from the country, who heard the explosion and ran down the street.

The young men saw the trio running southward across the bridge over the creek and made chase when the fleeing burglars fired three shots at them. The Ontario police were notified, and all bridges were covered, but the trio made good their escape.

Before commencing operations, the burglars took the precaution of plugging the village in darkness by cutting the electric light wires.

### SHOOT WOMAN IN COURT. Prisoner Makes Sensational Scene and Escapes.

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y., Sept. 10.—Yesterday afternoon Burt Carpenter went to the house of Mrs. Elizabeth Creighton, 30 years old, at Lewiston, and on her refusing to admit him he kicked the door in. Later he was arrested and spent the night in the lock-up.

This morning Carpenter was arraigned in the police court and sentenced to sixty days in the Niagara County Jail. As he was being taken from the court-room he met Mrs. Creighton, and before the officer could prevent it he shot her thru the body. The woman was brought to a hospital in the city in a serious condition.

During the excitement, Carpenter escaped a posse of citizens that went in pursuit of him.

### FINDS WRECK OF 1893. Fisherman Locates Propeller Dean Richmond in Lake Erie.

DUNKIRK, N.Y., Sept. 10.—Gus Ormsby, a fisherman, while lifting his nets off Vanburen Point, in Lake Erie, discovered the wreck of the propeller Dean Richmond, which was lost in a storm, with all on board, during a gale in October, 1893.

### PRIZE COURT OF HAGUE. Peace Conference Approves Project by Vote of 26 to 2.

THE HAGUE, Sept. 10.—The committee of the peace conference, to which the question was submitted to-day, approved by a vote of 26 to 2 the project of holding for the first time a supreme tribunal to deal with prizes captured at sea.

The tribunal will be composed of permanent judges from Great Britain, the United States, Russia, Germany, Austria-Hungary, Italy, France and Japan, and will have jurisdiction over prizes for a number of years, proportioned to the tonnage of their mercantile marine.

### WOMAN KILLED BY BURGLAR. Wife of Lieutenant of U. S. Navy Shot Thru the Heart.

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 10.—Mrs. Mary Lawless Rorschach, wife of Lieut. Frank Rorschach, north of the city, and sister of Joseph T. Lawless, former secretary of the Commonwealth of Virginia, was murdered in her home here last night by an unknown burglar.

She was shot thru the heart with her own pistol, taken from her hand by the burglar after she had fired twice at him thru an open door leading into the kitchen, where he was cornered.

Thomas Archer, a mulatto, was arrested on suspicion.

### PRINTERS BACK AT WORK. Strike Lasting Two Years Settled on Eight-Hour Day.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Twenty union printers will start to work to-day at "cases" which they have not touched for more than two years in the composing rooms of the Falthorn Printing company.

The typesetters were involved in one of the longest strikes on record in Chicago, which was ended yesterday when the firm agreed to adopt the 8-hour work day.

### Changes in C.P.R. Muskoka Schedule. On and after Monday, Sept. 16, the "Lakeland Limited," northward, will leave Toronto at 11:30 a.m., and the "Queen City Flyer," southward at 1 p.m., will be discontinued. On the new schedule trains will leave Toronto at 9 a.m., and for Craighurst at 6:15 p.m., southbound, leaving Craighurst at 7:45 a.m., and Bala at 3:40 p.m. all daily, except Sunday.

### BRITISH ARMY BALLOON GOES WRONG IN THE AIR

Makes Semi-Circle of Two Miles and Settles Down in Some Trees.

FARNBOROUGH, Eng., Sept. 10.—The new airship designed for the British army, following the example set by the French and Germans in aerial navigation, made an ascent from here to-day in charge of Col. Capper, Capt. King and P. S. Cody, the American, who has spent a number of years in the British service, in charge of the kite section of the army.

After making a semi-circle of about two miles around Farnborough and Cove Common, an accident occurred to the engines and, in spite of the throwing out of ballast by the aeronauts, of which the airship carried 800 pounds, the dirigible balloon settled down into some trees. It was said that the defect which developed was only slight, and can easily be remedied.

During the trip the wind blew at the rate of fifteen miles, against which the airship had no difficulty in navigating.

The balloon portion of the airship is cigar-shaped, has a capacity of 7500 cubic feet. The car is made of aluminum and canvas.

### FOUR MORE BATTLESHIPS. ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 10.—The Novore Vremya says it learns that the ministry of marine is about to order four battleships of 21,000 tons.

### China's Awakening. PEKIN, Sept. 10.—The throng to-day applauded the visit of the Hsi and Ting Shi Hnei to be imperial commissioners, with instructions to separate and visit Japan, Great Britain and Germany, for the purpose of examining and reporting on the constitutional systems of these countries.

### JUDGE TRUSTS THIEF. Gave a Convicted Letter-Carrier Two Months to Prepare for Prison.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Two months ago John E. McCaffrey, a letter-carrier, twenty years old, was found guilty of stealing a letter, and Judge Keneasaw M. Landis sentenced him to one year in the House of Correction. In imposing the sentence Judge Landis said:

"I am going to give you two months to prepare yourself and your wife for this separation. I want you to give me your word of honor that you will at the end of that time go to the House of Correction and give yourself up."

For a moment the man was dazed by this unusual and unexpected generosity. Then he said:

"I gave my word to Judge Landis that I would give myself up at the Bridewell to-morrow," he says, "and I am going to do it, but it is hard on my wife and the little fellow."

### STRAP-HOLDER EJECTED. And Now London Railway Companies Are Perplexed.

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 10.—A peculiar point of law regarding passengers' rights in trains has been raised by the penalty imposed by a magistrate here on Mortimer Burgess, a clerk, who refused to leave a compartment that already contained a full complement of passengers when requested to do so by another passenger.

As thousands travel every day with their baggage, the railway companies say nobody can have a strap-holder ejected, but the problem will not be solved until it is argued in a court of law.

### Auto Passenger Killed. PITTSBURGH, Sept. 10.—One woman was killed and four other persons seriously injured in Allegheny early today, when a large automobile skidded along a street in making a turn and striking the curb stone, threw the occupants against telegraph poles. Miss Helen Williams of Allegheny died in a hospital.

### Two-Cent Fare Appeal. OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—The Grand Trunk appeal against the decision of the railway commission that the company must run third-class cars at two cents a mile fare between Montreal and Toronto has been put down for hearing at the coming session of the supreme court.

**SET BACK OF TWO YEARS. President of Contracting Co. Says Loss Will Be Fourth of First Estimate.**

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 10.—David Reeves, president of the Phoenix Bridge Co., said to-day that, although the enquiry into the contractor's loss as a result of the fall of the Quebec cantilever bridge had not been completed, he did not believe that the loss would be one-fourth as large as was at first supposed.

Other officials declared that the work of rebuilding the bridge would be continued if the Canadian Government did not object.

"Several weeks must elapse before any conclusion as to the cause of the accident can be reached," said one of them. "However, I can say that it will take two years of hard work to reach the stage of completion at which we stood when the accident occurred."
