



If Sir Wilfrid had had his way Canada's loyalty to the Mother Country would have been impos-sible for Canada to accept the Laurier-Wiman proposais and still retain her un-divided loyalty to the Mother Country. As the people saved Sir Wilfrid from dis-grace on that occasion, so they have saved him to-day. The Premier's original deci-sion was against the sending of a Canadian contingent. This decision he arrived at a fiter a great deal of careful consideration. "There is no menace to Canada," said he, "and, although we might be willing to con-tribute troops, I don't see how we can do so. Then, again, how could we do so without Parliament granting us the money?


