That our shops are prepared to make it easier for the Christmas shopper is seen by the cunning hints which are thrown out from the various departments of our many dry goods houses. Tempting looking girls are suggested on all sides, and happy is the man or woman who is not tied down to a few dollars. Dress lengths in silk and wool and muslin are prettily arranged in fancy boxes, and tied with ribbons; blouse lengths of silk or satin, from sober black and navy to the most ravishing shades in blue, pink, heliotrope or yellow are arranged in similar fashion to tempt the Christmas purchaser, for well do the shopkeepers know that such are dear to the feminine heart. These dress and blouse lengths are to be had in all prices, from a couple of dollars or so up to the highest price the buyer can afford. Gloves also are done up in fetching boxes—why is it that things look so attractive in boxes?—one to half a dozen pairs, in serviceable tans, or the white and pearl grey shades for dress and evening wear. Silken hose and hose in finest black cambric, these latter at 65 and 75 cents a pair, stitched and decorated across the top with red or purple silk, are also among the attractive gifts of the season, and come in lots of three pairs in green boxes. Of muslin hosiery there is an endless display; just now, and they come from the slightly embroidered or lace edged at 10 or 15 cents to the exquisite real lace affairs with cowbird borders that cost from \$25 to \$50. The all-ways acceptable plain hemstitched handkerchiefs are shown in boxes of half a dozen or a dozen each, as the purchaser chooses. One notices that this is always a department where women most do congregate at this season of the year, for the handkerchief, plain, silk, embroidered or lace, is a perennially popular gift. Fascinating things in jabots also come to draw the shillings from the feminine purses of Christmas gifts. Those in dainty plisse chiffon in three pieces that fall with ready edges down the front of the bodice, or with borders of exquisite lace, the black or cream Spanish lace fichus, or the quaint lace barbs—all these are much sought after while the new silk scarves with fringed ends, for wearing under the coat for warmth and to preserve the collar, are also finding themselves among the Christmas presents stowed away till the blessed day arrives.

### YALE PROFESSOR ARRESTED.

**Dr. Osborne Accused of Unlawful Disinterment of the Body of a Colored Girl.**  
New Haven, Conn., Dec. 14.—Dr. Oliver T. Osborne, professor of Materia Medica and Therapeutics in Yale Medical School, and also a practicing physician connected with Yale dispensary, was taken into custody at 2 o'clock this morning on a charge of alleged unlawful disinterment of a body. The remains of Beatrice Van Lew, a 12-year-old colored girl, who was buried in the Westville cemetery yesterday afternoon, were removed from the grave shortly before 6 o'clock last evening and taken to an undertaker's morgue. Dr. Osborne, the mother of the girl to permit from an autopsy, providing the other members of the family did not know of it. The doctor was released on bail.

### Jury Failed to Agree.

Before Judge McLaughlin yesterday, in the Criminal Session, George Ellis Whitechurch Township was tried on a charge of receiving goods stolen by James McNeil from Robert Ellis's general store at Ballantray, on Nov. 15 last. The jury failed to agree, and the case was set to appear at the next court. T. C. Robinson appeared for the defense. Barnes of Markham-street was charged with a serious offence, the prosecutor being Mary Tracey. The grand jury indicted Henry McInerney, charged with setting fire to the C.P.R. elevator at the foot of Bathurst-street on Nov. 22 last. True bills were also returned against William Trimble and George Dixon, theft; and Edwin T. Hitchcock, unmentionable crime.

### BISHOP McEAVY'S APPOINTMENT

Formally Announced From Rome Yesterday, With Other Appointments—Pontiff Much Acclaimed.

Rome, Dec. 14.—At the consistory held to-day the Pope formally announced the appointment of a number of bishops, including that of Mgr. Fergo McEavy to the Bishopric of London, Ont., which he has been occupying since August last.

The Pope also announced the appointment of Mgr. Falconio, the apostolic delegate to Canada as Metropolitan of Lario, and of Mgr. Frederic Eliaux to the United Seas of Saint Ste. Marie and Marquette. The consistory was held in the Salle Regia, with the usual grand ceremonial, and in the presence of the diplomatic corps, the Roman nobility and many prominent strangers, including ladies. The Pope appeared to be in good health. He smiled continually, and was in an excellent humor.

A secret consistory in the Sistine Chapel followed, at which the Pope delivered an allocution of a wholly religious character, and performed the ceremony of opening and closing the mouths of the new cardinals, who were in the Ducal Hall, where crowds witnessed the procession.

### CONSUMERS DOES NOT CARE.

If the Montreal People Do Not Want His Business He Won't Force Himself.

The World yesterday met a gentleman who had recently seen Mr. Conners, the head of the Montreal elevator syndicate. Mr. Conners, he said, had just returned from Chicago with contracts in his pockets for forwarding to Atlantic ports 60 million bushels of American grain next season. Mr. Conners stated to The World's informant that he was prepared and willing to send this grain via Montreal if the harbor commissioners of that port gave him the necessary facilities, but if they didn't afford these facilities he would send the grain via Buffalo and the American railroads. Mr. Conners as much as intimated that he was not going to force himself and his business on the people of Montreal if they didn't want him.

### INDIAN WILL NOT HANG.

Paul Sabourin, Now in Edmonton Jail, Gets Life Imprisonment.

Ottawa, Dec. 14.—An order-in-Council has been passed and approved by Lord Minto, committing the death sentence, passed on Paul Sabourin, an Indian, for the shooting of his sister-in-law, to imprisonment for life. Sabourin, who is in Edmonton Jail, where he was tried and convicted, was sentenced to be hanged on the 22nd inst. The prisoner had no motive for committing the deed and it was plain that he was not in his right mind when he did so.

### LANDOWNE-AVENUE CROSSING.

The Lansdowne-avenue crossing affair came up before Mr. Justice Ross yesterday, and was enlarged till a decision has been reached by the Privy Council on or after Dec. 19.

### VON MIGUEL TO STEP DOWN.

Rain, Dec. 14.—It is announced in The Kline Journal that Minister of Finance Herr von Miguel will soon resign, having lost the confidence of the Emperor and the public at large. Other papers predict the same.

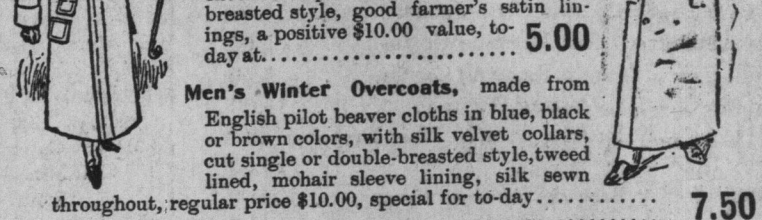
