PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA

Rev. D. Currie of Perth Elected Moderator-Tribute to Late King Edward.

St. John's Church this evening the Presbyterian Synod of Montreal and Ottawa was opened by Rev. John Hay, B.D., of Renfrew, who occupied the chair in the absence of the moderator elected at the last synod, Rev. Charles Tanner of Windsor Mills, Que., who died in January, 1910. D. Hay conducted the opening service and made a very touching reference to the late King. He hoped that his successor would walk in his footsteps. Out of respect to his late majesty and the late moderator, the choir loft and pulpit were draped in purple and black. The opening meeting was public and Rev. Dr. R. P. McKay of Toronto delivered an eloquent address from Isaiah By the definite and certain action of xxi., 11: "Watchman, what of the DR. A. W. CHASE'S KIDNEY He pointed out the growth

of Christianity and the spread of education in the countries of the near and far east, and expressed the opinion that the time was opportune for all Christian churches to join hand in hand for the conversion and education of the eastern races.

The synod was then formally opened and almost the first business was the election of a moderator. There were three nominations: Rev. D. Currie, Perth, Ont.; Rev. Dr. Love, St. Andrew's Church, Quebec City, and Rev. Mr. McDougall, Spencerville, Ont.

CONVICTED OF MURDER JURY SUGGESTS MERCY

Italian Found Guilty of Having Stabbed Companion in Drunken Row on Manning Avenue.

Guilty of murder, with a strong recommendation for mercy, was the verdict of the jury in the case of Pasquale Ventricini, after deliberating from 4:23 until 5.45 p.m. yesterday. Ventricini was charged with stabbing Raffaelo Fabbio to death in his home on Manning-avenue on March 6 last. "I think you could not do anything else reasonably," said Justice Riddell, after the verdict had been returned. "Of all the cases in which I have had occasion to try a murderer, there was only one native Canadian. He was a man who had ruined himself by drinaing." He had tried foreigners only too frequently. "You have arrived at an honest verdict," he said. "I agree with you."

Sentence will probably be passed this morning at 10 o'clock.

Accused pleaded not guilty when arraigned. The evidence of Dr. T. D. Archibald showed that deceased had received seven knife wounds, either of two being sufficient to cause death.

Detective Mitchell, who arrested the prisoner, found him either getting under or getting out from under a bed at 265 Claremont-street. Mitchell thought he had been drinking.

Tony Bush of 285 Manning-avenue, where deceased was taken after being stabbed, said he had walked up the street with the prisoner on the night of the murder, and when they got back they had had some words. Pasquale passed a remark about Tony's bister and Tony struck him.

Then the other Italians came up and deceased tried to hold prisoner away from witness. Pasquale then stabbed Fabbio. Tony had noticed before the stabbing that prisoner was carrying a knife wrapped up in a handkerchief. Rocco Delasandro, aged 12, an eye-witness, corroborated the story, venacio Delasandro, father of the boy, gave similar evidence.

The prisoner was then put in the box. He said he was 45 years of age, and had been in Canada for five years. He has a mustache that completely conceals his mouth. According to his story Tony had insulted him and had told him that he (witness) had in-

He got up and asked why he had been struck by a friend. Then he saw six men around striking at him. He claimed he did not remember what happened subsequently. 


