

## PROHIBITION WAVE SPREADS IN CHILE

Importation of Alcohol and Its Sale in Bars to Be Prohibited.

Santiago, Chile, Dec. 26.—One of the first official acts of President Arturo Alessandri, who assumed office on Thursday, was to receive a petition from the Chilean Federation of Labor, protesting against the alleged attempts of the league for the defence of the wine industry to force northern port workers to unload liquors. The labor organization has adopted a resolution, effective January 1, to refuse to unload liquors, whether of home or foreign manufacture.

The decision was brought before the senate by Senator William Edwards, who asked for an official declaration of the government's attitude with regard to "liberty in commerce" in view of the federation's action.

Defending the wine industry, Senator Edwards said a distinction should be drawn between "wine and liquor." He declared a real campaign is developing in Chile against alcohol and wine. He asserted the importation of alcohol and its sale in bars could be prohibited, but that it was not permissible to adopt measures which would "ruin a national industry, prejudice workers in this line of employment, and perhaps force a transformation of industry."

## FALL FROM ENGINE KILLED ENGINEER

Was Working on the Boiler  
Rail and Was Not at  
Once Missed.

Ottawa, Dec. 26.—James Babcock of Smiths Falls, employed by the C.P.R. as an engineer on the Toronto-Montreal line, died on Friday from injuries received in a fall from his engine near Merrickville. When the train pulled out from Merrickville Babcock was noticed by his fireman to be working on the boiler rail outside, and it was not until the train had traveled about two miles did he notice the engineer had failed to return. Babcock still was standing still attending to the boiler, the fireman looked out from the engine cab, but Babcock had disappeared. The fireman immediately notified the train dispatcher at Smith's Falls, and a light engine with one coach was sent from that place to search the line. About two miles east of Merrickville he was found lying in a ditch alongside the track, suffering from a fractured skull. The injured man was placed on the special train to be conveyed to Smith's Falls Hospital, but he succumbed to his injuries before reaching there. He is survived by a widow and five children.

## BROOKLYN WOMEN DIE AS RESULT OF QUARREL

New York, Dec. 26.—A man's matrimonial interest in one member of a feminine business partnership is believed to have caused a quarrel today between two Brooklyn women, who were found shot to death in their shop, "The Little Beauty Parlor."

Catching an automatic revolver in her right hand, Miss Anna Donagan, a nurse decorated by the French during the war, lay in the middle of the Little establishment, a bullet wound in her temple. Miss Edna Hague, 27, a widow, shot thru the back of the head, was lying at the door.

## STUNNED, DIES OF EXPOSURE.

St. John, N. B., Dec. 26.—Found dead beside the C. N. R. tracks early Christmas morning, Frederick Shields, an employee of the Golden Grove Woolen Mills, is believed by police to have probably been killed by exposure, but stunned, and so to have died of exposure.

Shields was known to have been on a train the previous night and it is supposed he fell from the cars.

Church is Entered.  
The car was seen around the scene of the shooting by several residents. It was learned today, and Chief Clark went to Hall's Corners, Binbrook, this afternoon in the hope of getting more information.

Further trouble was caused by the hands, and this afternoon the officials of the Methodist Church on the Binbrook-Glaxford line reported that the church was entered, but nothing taken except a pair of rubbers.

A jury empaneled by Chief Clark viewed the remains at the city morgue at noon today and adjourned until Wednesday night at 8:15 o'clock. The inquest is in charge of Chief Coroner Dr. G. S. Rogers.

Burial in Aurora, Ont.  
The late Dr. Whitworth was 48 years of age and a resident of Binbrook for many years. He was a member of Morton Lodge, of Perfection and Rose Croix Chapter, and the Orange lodge of Binbrook.

The funeral service will be in charge of Harmony Lodge, No. 57, A. F. and A. M., and will be held at 7 Green a.m. Following this service the remains will be taken to the city hall, where they will be held until 12:30 p.m. train to Toronto, where the body will be met by special car and conveyed to Aurora. Rev. Milton Carlier, of Jerseyville, will officiate and the remains will be accompanied by two sisters. He was well-known and highly esteemed.

## ITALIAN FATALLY SHOT, MAN AND WIFE HELD

Angelo Fuca, After Visiting Home of John Maranco, Is Shot While on Street—Two Firemen See Maranco in Flight and Effect His Arrest—Wife Held as Material Witness.

Angelo Fuca later died as the result of his wounds, and the charge against John Maranco has been changed to one of murder.

Hamilton, Dec. 26.—(Special.)—Wounded by a bullet from a 28-calibre revolver, Angelo Fuca, 67½, East Simcoe street, a twenty-five-year-old Italian, is dying in the City Hospital. Charged with having fired the shot, John Maranco, 301 North John street, aged 36 years, is in jail, and his wife, Mary Maranco, is held by the police as a material witness. According to attending doctors and hospital officials, there is no chance of Fuca recovering. He is shot thru the lower part of the right abdomen, and the bullet, which entered the front of his body, passed clean thru and out of his back, piercing the intestines, in several places.

Fuca, immediately after the shooting, said, according to the police, that he had been at the prisoner's home at a party. The police believe there was gambling going on, and there was some trouble about the game. Fuca left, and was walking away, when he was shot. He was seen by two firemen, who saw Maranco in flight, and effect his arrest. The prompt response of the two firemen prevented Maranco from escaping, and the police officials have complimented them on their quick action.

Prisoner Denies Guilt.  
Interviewed by the police tonight, the prisoner said he did not know who fired the shot. He said that three men were with him at the time the shooting occurred. He did not know which of them fired the shot. The police did not say whether or not they had the names of the three others said to have been there, but seem satisfied with the progress made following the shooting, and it is understood that they have convinced themselves as to who is responsible.

The hospital authorities stated late tonight that Fuca could not recover, and that it was but a matter of a few hours before he died.

## MERCHANT MISSING; FEARS FOR SAFETY

Christopher McCool of Fort William Not Seen for a Week.

Pembroke, Ont., Dec. 26.—Christopher McCool, formerly a merchant at Fort William, Ont., but more recently an overseer for the McCool Lumber Company, has been missing since Sunday, December 19, and it is feared he was either drowned or is lost in the woods of the Upper Ottawa. On Sunday week Mr. McCool started from one of the firm's camps at a place called "The Point," near the mouth of the Ottawa River, near Mattawa, to visit another camp three miles to the north of the river, which is about half a mile wide and about a mile long. Mr. McCool would probably have crossed the ice, which was not very strong at the time and Mr. McCool may have gone thru to his death, who no trace has been seen since.

Mr. McCool, who is a brother of Mr. C. A. McCool, ex-M.P. for Nipissing, and of Mrs. (Captain) Duggan, of Ottawa, was unmarried and about 57 years of age. A search party, led by Thomas and Ernest McCool, nephews, left Pembroke this morning for the scene.

## TO PROMOTE PATROLMEN WHO KILL BURGLARS

Chicago, Dec. 26.—Announcement that he would introduce at Wednesday's city council meeting a plan to make immediate promotion the reward for every patrolman or sergeant who kills a burglar or hold-up man in the act of committing a crime, is made by Alderman J. O. Kostner, "I believe it is what the people need," he said, "and it may seem a little cold-blooded, but I think it is a necessary step."

By his plan, Mr. Kostner said, five temporary lieutenants would be created for the use of Chief Fitzmorris.

## Planes Have Reached Chicago For Northern Oil Fields

Edmonton, Alta., Dec. 26.—Word was received yesterday from Captain Gorman and Captain "Wop" May, flying from New York with two huge airplanes for use by the Imperial Oil Company in the northern oil fields, that they had reached Chicago from Cleveland on Friday evening. They expected to leave Chicago on Saturday morning, on the next leg of their journey to Christmas Day.

## Arkansas Negro Lynched For Killing Policeman

Jonesboro, Ark., Dec. 26.—Wade Thomas, a negro who last night shot and killed Edgar Ragland, a policeman, during a raid on a dice game here, was taken from the jail tonight by about 400 citizens and after being paraded thru the business streets was hanged to a telegraph pole near the scene of his crime.

## THREE CARS BURNED IN A GARAGE FIRE

Fire broke out at the garage behind the residence now occupied by Mrs. Cryderman, 252 West Broad street, at eleven o'clock last night, and the garage building and three automobiles were destroyed. The fire, which was caused by a gas leak, was extinguished by the fire department. The garage was valued at about \$1000. The three automobiles destroyed were valued variously. That belonging to George Bonin was worth \$1800; that owned by F. P. Kelley \$1800, and Mr. Morton's automobile suffered a loss of approximately \$800. The cause was unknown.

## PULITZER TROPHY RACE TO BE HELD IN DETROIT

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 26.—The Pulitzer trophy race, the airplane classic of the U. S., is to be held here in 1921, and the winner will receive \$10,000. The race will be held at the Aviation Country Club. The decision was reached at a meeting of the club's board of directors with Lieut. Allen, of New York, who left for that city today to confer with the Aero Club of America on plans for the race.

As tentatively planned, the contest would be staged over a triangular course with the start at Selfridge field, the army air station near Mt. Clemens, Mich., and the finish at New York, for about 250 miles with 45 miles to a leg.

## WESTERN LAWYER BURNED WITH WOMAN IN SHACK

Moose Jaw, Sask., Dec. 26.—D. H. Cole, a lawyer of Moose Jaw, Sask., and a woman, Mrs. Anderson, whose address is unknown, were burned to death when a fire of unknown origin destroyed a shack Sunday morning here. Police and firemen arrived on the scene about 10:30 p.m. and found the bodies of a man and a woman lying in a room. A lamp, two whiskey bottles were found in the debris.

## Jackstones in Turkey's Crop Added to Weight of the Bird

Quebec, Dec. 26.—When an officer of the local police department brought home a twenty-pound turkey on Christmas Eve and found that the costly bird contained a pound and a half of jackstones, which he had duped, he immediately took the matter up, with the result that an action will be taken against a farmer in an outlying parish, who brought a large consignment of turkeys to the city.

## Argentine Aviator Falls In Making Dangerous Flight

Buenos Aires, Dec. 26.—Another attempt to make the dangerous 2,500 kilometre flight between Buenos Aires and Rio Janeiro, which already has cost several lives, was made yesterday by the Argentine aviator, Miguel Hearte, but he was forced to give up the trip when within 400 kilometres of Rio Janeiro. He had to make a forced landing on bad ground, damaging his airplane to such an extent that it would be impossible to continue to fly.

## GUATEMALA ABOLISHES TRADE RESTRICTIONS

Washington, Dec. 26.—The government of Guatemala, as a step toward the signing of a commercial treaty with the five republics of central America, has issued a decree abolishing trade restrictions between that country and the American countries of Honduras, Salvador, Nicaragua and Guatemala, which is announced by Dr. Julio Bianci, Guatemalan minister to Washington.

Baltimore, Md., Dec. 26.—While Cardinal Gibbons was reported to be resting in tonight, he had a very bad night Saturday. His condition was no improved today.

## NATURAL GAS WRECKS, SOMBRA BANK BUILDING

Brick Structure Blown to Pieces When Janitor Tries to Light Fires Christmas Morning, But He Escapes With Slight Injuries—Buildings Within a Block Are Shaken.

Sombra, One, Dec. 26.—The Sterling Bank Building here was completely demolished yesterday and buildings within a block had windows blown in. Mr. Ritchie, Stover's and Whitley's business places have scarcely a window left among them, and the plan was shaken down by an explosion of natural gas which had escaped into the building from a gas main. Edward Mullins, janitor of the bank, entered the place about 8:30 Christmas morning to light the fires. When he struck a match, natural gas, which had worked up thru the sewer, blew the brick building to pieces. Of the framework scarcely one board remains standing, and the gas main was painfully injured, but not seriously, and was able to be about later in the day.

## WORK IN UKRAINE IS GIVEN SUPPORT

Enthusiasm Runs High at Meeting of Jewish Residents of Ottawa.

Ottawa, Dec. 26.—One of the most enthusiastic and responsive meetings ever known in the annals of Jewish meetings in Ottawa, took place this evening at the Franco-Jewish Theatre, when the Jewish Orphan Society of Canada held the opening assembly in the million dollar drive for rescue work in the Ukraine.

In response to eloquent appeals made by the Rev. Dr. J. J. O'Connell, world, the many people present responded nobly and nearly \$6,000 was placed on the subscription list as its starting figure. A. J. Freeman started the list with \$1,000, and the list rapidly grew. A diamond and pearl ring was handed to one of the stewards, with a piece of paper on which was inscribed "from a mother," and a request that the ring be offered for sale.

## WOMEN DEMONSTRATE FOR DISARMAMENT

Washington, Dec. 26.—Conference of the National Woman's Party as a preliminary to the national convention to be held here, February 15 to 19, has been called for January 18 and 19, the first of the regular legislative committee members, and the second for the national chairmen.

Reports will be prepared on the advance of the party, continuing as a separate political group, and plans will be completed for the memorial pageant, which will accompany the presentation of Feb. 15 of states, to the capital of the United States, Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Lucretia Mott.

A demonstration on disarmament was conducted by the women's peace society, at the Franklin Monument today, the principal address being delivered by Mrs. Robert M. La Follette, New York, who was accompanied by Mrs. La Follette.

Mrs. La Follette declared that the women would vote to defeat senators and congressmen who stand "for war and militarism." She said, "On the issue of disarmament we shall hold the balance of power. We have the ballot. We propose to be practical. We are going to vote."

## FATAL EXPLOSION OF LOADED GAS PIPE

New York, N. Y., Dec. 26.—One boy was killed and two wounded today by the explosion of a piece of loaded gas pipe in the basement of a ten-story building in the Brooklyn home of Herbert Braun, 18 years old, who said he found the gas pipe while on a hunting trip near the house.

John McKenny, Jr., 16 years old, was killed instantly when a piece of steel went into his brain, and Braun, who was trying to open the pipe, lost his left hand and was cut by flying steel. Paul Clandow, 17, was also cut by the steel.

The explosion wrecked the room and knocked people from chairs in other parts of the house.

It is reported that the orders to the Italian regulars are not to harm unless provoked. D'Annunzio's spokesman said he also has ordered his officers not to fire until he gives the word.

## DEATH OF THEATRE OWNER.

Rochester, N. Y., Dec. 26.—Martin E. Wolf, of this city, principal owner and manager of the Lyceum Theatre here, and for about ten years associated with the Famous Players, died today of a heart attack. He was 54 years old. David Belasco and A. L. Earlander, in the management of the Empire Theatre in Syracuse, died in the Protestant Infirmary, Baltimore, on Friday evening, after an operation. He also was principal owner of the Hotel Seneca, Rochester.

## Strathroy Boy Succumbs To Injuries by Playmate

Strathroy, Ont., Dec. 26.—Johnny Shortt, youngest son of Thomas Shortt, of this town, died today from injuries to his head, supposed to have been caused when he was hit on the head by a piece of brick thrown by another boy a few days ago.

## MISS CALLAGHAN'S DEATH.

Montreal, Dec. 26.—The death of Miss Anna Augusta Callaghan, manager of the Famous Players, occurred this afternoon at her residence, 4180 West Sherbrooke street, after an illness of one week. Miss Callaghan had been for ten years connected with the employment office of the company and was well known in Montreal, being a member of several of the social leagues in the city. She was born in Toronto and was a graduate of the University of Toronto.

She is survived by three sisters: Mrs. John Doherty of Toronto, Miss A. E. Callaghan of Los Angeles, and two brothers, Leo Callaghan of Los Angeles and Frank Callaghan of Sault Ste. Marie.

## FRENCH SOCIALISTS CERTAIN TO SPLIT

Determination to Affiliate With Moscow Internationale Will Carry.

## MUCH DISCONTENT PREVAILS

Tours, France, Dec. 26.—All the delegations have completed their reports to the congress of the French Socialist party in session here, adding to the approximate certainty that the party will split, the left section supporting the Moscow Internationale, and the right wing remaining as the Socialist party, but with a small minority.

Many federations from the agricultural regions announced today that they would support the motion to adhere to the Moscow Internationale. Premier Laguey's electoral district of Lot-et-Garonne supported the "maximum communist program," and its delegates were instructed to vote for adherence to the Moscow program.

There are not only wide differences over the issues, but many recriminations over the party's practices. A delegate from Annam, Indo-China, protested today that the Socialists' deputies were not protecting the interests of the Socialists and alleged it was a capital offence to be a Socialist in Indo-China.

Deputy Valentin-Couturier of the Seine department reported that the only hope for the "oppressed" colony of joining the communist congress of Orienta peoples at Baku, iff a hundred right wing deputies shouted in reply.

"That's the congress that admits Enver Pasha" (former Turkish war minister).

The congress opened yesterday with 450 delegates, representing 180,000 members of the party. It was decided to take up immediately the question of joining the Moscow Internationale, and this question was last on the program. The delegates will vote by mandate, but received their instructions from their constituents.

## WOMAN KILLED IN STREET CAR SMASH

The automobile was smashed to splinters, and Mrs. Laybourne, who was sitting on the side affected, was crushed to death instantly. Mr. Lay, of three years, and his wife, who were both injured by flying glass as well as being thrown from the car, were both seriously injured. Mrs. Laybourne was traveling east and west on the street car, and Dr. Gibbons, St. John's hospital, who was called to the scene, attended the injured before they were sent to the Western Hospital.

The postmaster at the Keele street station, Mr. J. H. Laybourne, who was traveling west at the moment of the crash, and that for some reason not yet known, the train suddenly swerved straight toward the street car, striking it head on. At this way the police, Eyer, who was in the front of the street car, struck the force, Mrs. Laybourne being thrown against the car in the impact. There was a collision in the car at the time, but there were six in the train.

## RADIAL CAR HIT MOTOR; THREE PERSONS INJURED

Gordon Eyer, aged 18, of Mimico, was seriously injured about 11 o'clock in West Toronto, when the motor car he was driving came into collision with a radial car, which was on the same avenue intersection. Miss Katherine Wellwood, 183 Cowan avenue, a passenger in the motor, lost four teeth, and Arthur Noonan suffered a laceration of his scalp and back.

According to the police, Eyer was driving at a high rate of speed along east on Dundas street, when the collision occurred. A Crescent car was waiting for the radial to pass, and it is thought that in the excitement of the moment Eyer hesitated to apply the brakes when he discovered that a collision might be inevitable. The tender of the radial was badly smashed, and the automobile was demolished.

## OTTAWA'S CIVIC FIGHT.

Ottawa, Dec. 26.—With 62 candidates announcing themselves for the 23 seats of the Ottawa city council, the nomination proceedings tomorrow promise to be particularly interesting. Three candidates are in the field for the city magistracy, 13 for the board of control chairs, and 46 for 18 aldermanic seats. The majority candidates will probably be Controller Joseph Kent, Controller Frank Plant and W. H. Cuff, former city auditor.

## FLUME EXTENDED ITS STATE OF SOVEREIGNTY TO INCLUDE IT.

Venice, Dec. 26.—The extension of time has been asked by D'Annunzio at Plume for the purpose of excommunicating persons residing there but not belonging to the city.

An airplane of D'Annunzio's forces has been captured while making a forced landing near Sussak.
