**SLAVE HORRORS DUPLICATED BY GERMAN FORCES**

Families in Evacuated Villages Ruthlessly Broken Up by Deportations—Cruelty Was De-liberate

With the French army, April 21.—By this time the whole civilized world has an idea of the crimes against civilization which have been committed by the Germans in the districts watered by the Somme, the Oise and the Aisne, from which they have been driven out by the combined French and British forces, but the accounts published limited the descriptions to the way they had destroyed property. Little has been said of the brutal behavior to the inhabitants themselves.

The Germans have acted towards the French as the Babylonians did to the Jews. As soon as they saw retreat inevitable, especially in February and March of this year, they began a systematic deportation of the population. They carried away captive people of both sexes and of all ages, from 14 to 60, to break up families of the unhappy innocents in their power. As they broke up the homes of the victims, children were torn from their parents, parents from their children and brothers from their sisters without the slightest regard to the cruel sufferings inflicted. No worse crime was committed by the most brutal masters in the had old days of negro slavery. About these modern German deportations there is no redeeming spirit. They are sheer, unabashed vindictiveness. They are carried out without the slightest regard for the feelings or comfort of the victims. From one village they carried off the people at half-past three in the morning. Another village received only one hour's warning of its impending fate. The people of a third they kept shut up for two days in bitterly cold weather in a building, the windows of which were broken, and the only bed being the floor, before they were sent off on their long journey to the fatherland. No regard was paid to the state of health of those chosen for this modern, enlightened form of slavery. In many cases, in spite of the Arctic conditions, no opportunity was given them of providing themselves with the necessary extra clothing.

So much for the treatment of actual captives, who, needless to say, are still being employed in many instances in work of a military nature, contrary to the conventions agreed on before the war by all civilized nations and by Germany. The plight of those left while others were taken was hardly less wretched. They were forced to do work that their oppressors had no right to exact, which, in fact, the Germans expressly found themselves, when still ranked as a civilized nation, not to do. These people were terrorized by a deliberate system of fine and imprisonment, inflicted for either trivial offences against the rules or no offences. As individuals and as communities, their goods and money were stolen or deliberately smashed and burnt. The hat of spoils included not only the dregs of the German soldiers, but were headed by highly-placed military officials—they do not deserve the titles of officers—such as General von Pleck and the Grand Duke of Hesse.

These things are not vague generalities. They are known to be true. They happened all over the district now happily re-occupied. By what its armies have done under orders and, after the example of its officers in this part of France, where the French have been able to find out for a certainty what happened these past two years under German rule, the whole German nation—until it repents in sackcloth and ashes—has put itself outside the pale of ordinary erring humanity, because its wickedness is no error, nor yielding to overmastering temptation, but deliberate setting up of calculated cruelty as
