HARDWARE MARKETS  
"Hardware and Metal." May 29, said: "The markets this week show usual heavy weekly list of price changes, mostly all upwards. The continued increasing strength of the iron and steel markets is constantly reflected in the prices of manufactured products. Bolts of all kinds, and nuts have scored advances this week, the former to the extent of 10c per cent, and the latter 8.50 per cent. Binder wire prices have advanced 2 to 3c lb., and one large company has stopped looking orders for future delivery. Among many other lines on which prices have advanced this week are: door knobs, cast padlocks, carpet felt, horse clippers, tackle blocks, hole saws, iron clocks, range boilers, galvanizing tanks. The ingot market all show a firm tone. The iron and steel markets are increasing markets. In the sheet market the sheet is now one of delivery rather than of stock. A large number of drivers for cartage companies at Toronto has added further trouble to a badly congested freight situation. The iron and steel markets have had considerable trouble in securing shipments. Recent dull and wet weather has driven down the price of summer goods, but business generally has been satisfactory. The ready-made market is decidedly firm. White lead in oil is firm at the recent advance price. Linseed oil shows firmness again this week."

THIRD SHIP TO SEEK PARTY IN THE ARCTIC



The American Museum of Natural History has announced that it has chartered the steamer Neptune and will send it to the relief of the Crocker Land expedition, which has been marooned in the Arctic since 1913. This will be the third attempt to reach the expedition, the first efforts proving failures. Captain Robert A. Bartlett, who was with Peary in his arctic explorations, will command the Neptune. The ship is now in the service of the British government as a coal carrier. It is expected the relief expedition will start about July 1, and successful should return in September. Members of the Crocker Land expedition who are in Etah were sent out in 1913 by the Museum of Natural History, the American Geographical Society and the University of Illinois. The expedition consists of six scientists and the crew.

DETAILS OF PLANS FOR THE SOLDIERS

Recognizing that both the existing barracks and the present medical institutions, the commission announces that it has decided to leave the treatment in the hands of the present medical staff subject to inspection by the commission's medical superintendent. Any additional medical staff necessary will be provided by the M. H. C. The new wards which are to be built will be erected by the commission and the provincial government jointly, each paying half the cost. The commission will pay the hospital management and the treatment of the military patients, and when the soldiers are all through the new buildings become the property of the province. In erecting sanitariums the commission has adopted the most up-to-date and widely approved plans known to tuberculosis specialists. Through the methods of treatment in these modern scientifically conducted sanitariums, the percentage of recoveries is very high. More than half of the tuberculosis patients treated by the M. H. C. had never left Canada, so that it has not been found that conditions at the front have created much more tuberculosis than conditions among the ordinary civilian and military population at home.
