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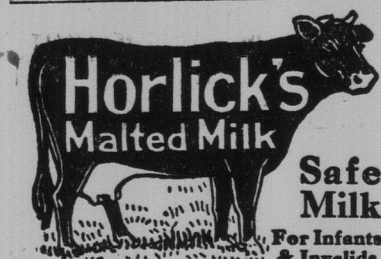

Canadian Food Controller's Sugges-
tions of War-time Dishes
For Monday

Instead of beef tomorrow serve fish
omelet.
Fish Omelet

(For four people)
2 heaped tablespoons cooked fish, 2
eggs, 1 tablespoon grated cheese, pinch
of cayenne and salt. Beat the yolks of
the eggs and add the cheese and season-
ing. Fold in the whites of the eggs, whip-
ped to a stiff froth, and put the
mixture quickly into a frying-pan or
omelet pan, in which the butter has
been melted. When the eggs begin to
set, stir in the fish, and cook until the
omelet is done.

Save white bread by mixing rye flour
with wheat flour sometimes.

Try Boston Brown Bread

Rye meal, 1 cup; granulated corn-
meal, 1 cup; Graham flour, 1 cup; city
molasses, 1/2 cup; sour milk, 3 cups; soda,
1 1/2 level teaspoons; salt, 1 level tea-
spoon. Fill to two-thirds well greased
baking powder cans; grease the lids, and
put them on. Place in a steamer, and
steam three and a half hours.

Charlottetown Pastor Heads
Baptist Convention

Succeeds A.A. Wilson, K.C.

Report Shows Acadia University
To Be Strong Financially But
With Student Body Depleted
By War

Halifax, Oct. 20.—A large number of
delegates were in attendance at the
opening meeting of the United Baptist
convention at 9.30 this morning, when
the first vice-president, Rev. C. W. Rose,
of Amherst (N. S.), called the conven-
tion to order and introduced the Rev.
Bowley Green, of Moncton (N. B.), as
the leader of the devotional services
throughout the convention. Mr. Green's
voice is a new one to the convention. He
is pastor of the largest church in the
convention. Mr. Green is a native of
England who has spent twenty-five years
in the United States and who is now
under the British flag. He spoke of the
first address of the series on Christ
leaving Judea.

At 10 o'clock the president, A. A.
Wilson, K. C., of St. John, called the
convention to business. The president ap-
pointed the following nomination com-
mittee: Rev. D. Hutchinson, W. L.
Archibald, G. B. McDonald, M. Addi-
son, J. G. A. Belyea, R. S. Phillips, F.
E. Bishop, C. A. Brittain, M. S. Rich-
ardson, W. C. Mackinnon and D. C. Clark.
Words of welcome from the citizens of
Halifax were spoken by Mayor Martin.
His worship graciously welcomed all to
the gateway of Canada. He spoke of
this as the first time that he had had the
honor of welcoming a religious gathering

pastor of the First church, welcomed
the convention on behalf of the Baptist
churches of the city. Rev. J. E. Wilson,
of Woodstock (N. B.), replied feelingly
to the words of welcome.

The pastors of the Baptist churches of
the city were named as the commit-
tee on arrangements. Rev. E. Bowditch
and G. N. Masse, of the Grand Ligne
mission, were invited to seats in the
convention. A cablegram was received
from Major J. H. McDonald, overseas
chaplain, conveying greetings.

Rev. A. Cohorn presented the financial
report of the board of governors of Acadia
University. The finances of the uni-
versity have felt the stronger of war
conditions. Receipts for the forward
movement were \$20,229.15. Of this, \$24,
229.45 was from the Joshua Goodwin
estate. Fifteen thousand dollars has
been paid on the building account of the
women's residence. The total value
of assets is \$947,765.81. The current ac-
count of Acadia Collegiate Academy is
\$18,624.44, with a deficit of \$274.57.
Acadia Ladies' Seminary shows a cur-
rent account of \$31,127.48, with deficit
\$1,347.92. The farm account shows
earnings of \$47,209, a profit of \$801.19.
I. B. Oakes, D. C. L., secretary of the
board of governors, presented the gen-
eral report of the board. The effect of
the war was very evident in the de-
creased attendance at the college and
academy. Roy Ross, M. A., succeeds
Professor J. F. Stevens in the chair of
German; Mary Kinlay Ingraham,
M. A., becomes librarian. The students
of Acadia Ladies' Seminary have raised
about \$1,000 for the Red Cross work since
the beginning of the war.

Suitable reference was made to the de-
mise of a distinguished alumnus of
Acadia University, the late chief justice
of the Nova Scotia Supreme Court, Sir
Wallace Graham, K. B.

Second Session.

The second session of the United Baptist
convention was opened by Rev.
Bowley Green, who spoke on Christ's
Journey Through Samaria.

The report on obituaries was presented
by Rev. J. H. Jenner. Suitable men-
tion was made in touching language to
some worthy ones who had finished their
course. Special mention of Rev. M. E.
Fletcher, formerly foreign mission and
financial secretary to Rev. Robert D.
Porter, the veteran among the ministers
of the convention; Rev. Manuel Niles,
a native of Abyssinia; Rev. J. W. West
and Rev. W. M. Field. Among pastore-
wives, mention was made of Mrs. R. B.
Kinley, Mrs. R. H. Bishop, Mrs. J. D.
McFadden and Mrs. Carpenter. Mention
was made of a large number of worthy
deacons. Special mention was made of
Deacon B. H. Eaton.

The following sons of pastors have
fallen in defence of the empire: Percy
R. Allaby, Phillips Beals, Berton De-

Wolf, A. J. Peters, Frank E. Porter,
Bernard Freeman Trotter, and George
McGregor.

Mention was also made of the service
of the late Sir Wallace Graham.

The adoption of the report was finally
moved by Rev. David Hutchinson, D.
D., and seconded by Rev. F. H. Beals.
New Officers.
The following officers were elected:
Vice-president, Rev. J. E. Wilson; assist-
ant secretary, Rev. H. Y. Payzant, Rev.
W. G. Hanton; treasurer, John Bur-
goyne; editor Gen. Book, R. J. Colpitts;
committee on correspondence, Dr. Co-
hohn, Dr. DeWolfe, Rev. J. H. Jenner,
W. C. Cross, J. A. Smallman. Rev. H.
T. DeWolfe reported for the board of
Sunday schools and young people's work.
There are 624 Sunday schools, 41,621
scholars, 24,780 average attendance. The
receipts, \$29,822.82.

At this point the Rev. C. H. Free-
man, of Charlottetown (P. E. I.), was
elected president on the third ballot,
with Rev. E. E. Daley, vice-president
for Nova Scotia. The retiring president,
A. A. Wilson, delivered his address.

J. Wesley Dimock, treasurer of de-
nominational funds, presented his report,
showing receipts as follows: Receipts
by the denominational treasurer, as
above, \$53,614.45; receipts by Sunday
school board treasurer, \$2,217.69; re-
ceipts by U. B. Women's Missionary
Union, \$23,978.18; receipts by mission

bands, \$4,920.92; total for the maritime
provinces, \$84,531.44. This report shows
an increase of more than \$10,000 over
the gifts of last year. The churches con-
tributing the largest amount are Brun-
swick street, Fredericton, \$2,210; Ger-
main street, St. John, \$2,297; Amherst
(N. S.), \$2,769.

Saturday evening at the United Baptist
convention, was educational night.
The speakers were Doctors W. D. Archi-
bald, H. T. DeWolfe and G. B. Cullen.

The speakers insisted that the educa-
tion of the new age must be Christian.
Rev. J. H. Jenner, of St. John, pre-
sented the convention sermon on Sunday
morning speaking with great power of
A Good Minister of Jesus Christ. The
afternoon session was in the interests of
Sunday school and young people's work.
Dr. Cullen spoke of the responsibility
of the church for the Sunday school.

Clash in Baptist Convention.

Woodstock, Ont., Oct. 20.—Rev. J. D.
S. Farmer, of Ottawa, yesterday precipi-

tated the first serious clash in the On-
tario and Quebec Baptist convention
here when he said that if the people of
Quebec province generally had respon-
ded as readily as the evangelical portions
of the population had done to the coun-
try's call to service, a compulsory mili-
tary service measure would not have
been necessary. He believed also that
the formation of a union government had
served only to make matters worse.

Rev. Dr. Shields, of Toronto, said he
did not feel of that opinion, and said
he thought that the fact should be made
clear that Mr. Farmer was not express-
ing the sentiments of the convention.
