## BASEBALL

## Pitts Released

Pittsburg, Feb. 17.—Barney Dryfus, president of the Pittsburg Nationals, announces that Joe Kelley, outfielder, has been released to Indianapolis of the American Association. Clarence E. Berger, outfielder, to Richmond of the International League, and Thomas Quigley, pitcher, unconditional release.

## Four Released

Chicago, Feb. 16.—Four players including Tommy Leach, last year's captain of the team, have been unconditionally released by the Chicago Nationals. The others are Charles Smith and Edward Stack, pitchers, and William Sweeney, second baseman. Leach before joining the Chicago Nationals was a star outfielder for the Pittsburg Club and was one of the best known players in the country.

Ty Cobb is now 28 years old. He has faced ten seasons under the big test, and within two weeks will be in action training for his 11th campaign. Cobb when in action, takes greater chances than any other man in the game. He plays harder and travels at higher speed than any other power and bulk of Wagner and Lajoie, more than one historian figured several years ago that Cobb's career would hardly run beyond ten campaigns. They figured some bad injury or a general weariness down of the system from too heavy strain would soon start him back. Yet after ten years he is Tyrrus still at the head of the procession, only 28 years old. Cobb was out of sixty ball games last season, so he stole but thirty-five bases, well below his normal. In 1911 his greatest year, Ty pilfered eighty-three bases. In 1912 his record was sixty-one steals. In 1913 it was fifty-two. In 1914 it was thirty-five. From eighty-three to thirty-five is quite a drop and this might argue for a general decline in speed. On the contrary, it probably argues for a little extra eagerness on Ty's part. A 10-year jaunt at the pace he has been traveling takes something out of one's system. Ty knows it, and with his old speed practically intact, has decided upon what Professor Pinchot might call "the conservation of his natural resources."

Last season Cobb was out a big part of the summer, and when he started back in was well behind such stars as Jackson, Speaker and Collins in batting. They were leading him as late as the first of September. Yet at the finish he was twenty-four points beyond Collins and thirty batting points beyond Speaker and Jackson.

So he must still be rated an even bet against the field when it comes to a match of reaching first by the basest route. A man who has landed in front eight years in succession is worth a bet until he is finally displaced. He can't keep on forever, but twenty-eight isn't at the end of the jaunt. Wagner led the National League in 1911, when Honus was thirty-seven years old.

## INTERNATIONAL

## MAY JOIN FEDS.

## New York Opinion is That it Would Be Perfectly Justified

New York, Feb. 16.—That the strongest element in the International Baseball League is dealing with the Federals is said to be beyond doubt and the one sure thing so far as the alliance is concerned. Details from that city are not taken seriously by the men responsible here for the news about the movement, and are declared to be simply stop-gap statements considered necessary before the final plunge is completely prepared. It has developed that organized baseball has none of the great common fighting fund, of which it was said to be possessed any more than the International has the \$50,000 war fund that was sold about so freely a few days ago.

There will be no sympathy wasted when Federals are looked to for a helping hand. Organized ball has treated the International very shabbily, in view of the fact that it has been one of the two leagues that has borne the brunt of the fighting for the last year. Several other cities in the east would have been glad to shelter the clubs driven out of their old homes by the encroachment of the Federals, but these cities were in territory belonging to still other leagues and these smaller leagues would have to be reimbursed.

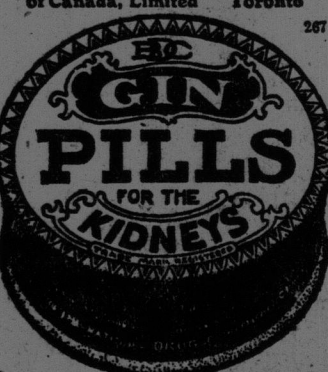
The International league could not carry the burden of this reimbursement along with the rest of its load and it looks as if organized baseball might have pitched in and helped out to its own ultimate profit.

By allowing the International to shift for itself, so to speak, it is only inviting still further encroachment from the other, and without material assistance from organized ball, the International could not be blamed if it went over to the Federals, horse, foot and guns, as is tributary to the organization. Some of the reported projects include an invasion of New England with Hartford, Springfield and Worcester as places where teams of a higher classification than the New England League could be made successful. This, of course, would have to be arranged with the New England League.

## BASEBALL TEAMS SOON GOING SOUTH

Where the Clubs of the National, American and Federal Leagues Will Train

Within the next three weeks more than 700 baseball players will be scattered through the south and southwest training for the annual pennant races of the National, American and Federal leagues. With the gathering of veterans and recruits the baseball situation will pass through another stage of the progress which marks the annual seasons of the national sport. Managers, league executives and legal authorities will give way to the player so far as popular interest is concerned and the coach's cries will silence the wrangling of rival combinations.

While a majority of the twenty-four clubs composing these three leagues have selected their spring training camps and set the dates for the reporting of players there is still a possibility that two or three may alter their plans at the last moment. As the lists stand at present, however, the south Atlantic states will be the scene of the greatest activity. Georgia will quarter six clubs within her borders while Florida will entertain five. Texas has been named by four clubs as the state wherein to prepare for the 1915 campaign. Mississippi, Arkansas and Virginia claim two each, while California, Cuba, Kentucky and North Carolina will have at least one squad training within their boundaries during March.
