American Can Touches New High Record; Others Make Point Gains

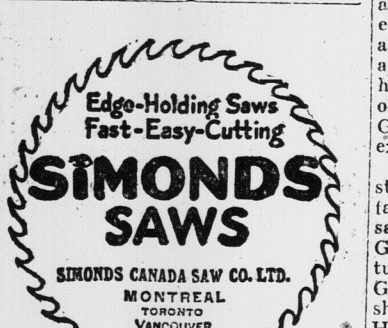
Canadian Press MONTREAL, Feb. 20.—Stock prices were strong at the opening of trading on the Montreal market this morning, and the trade volume was fair. National Breweries, Brazilian Traction and Consolidated Smelters accounted for most of the sales during the first half hour. The first named came out with an over-night gain of a quarter at 66. Smelters was up a like fraction at 246 and Brazilian was steady at 97. Canadian Steamships preferred was firm selling up 1/4 at 64 1/2.

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GRAND MANAN MAN, 27, LOSES HANDS AND FEET

Nelson Greenlaw, North Head, Considered Victim of Liquor And Frost

LAY IN SNOW EIGHT HOURS AT 10 BELOW

Heavy Clothing Worn Was Only Thing That Prevented Death

NELSON GREENLAW, a young married man about 27 years of age, lies in his home in North Head, Grand Manan Island, in a precarious condition, as a result of frost bite and exposure, the result of lying out for seven or eight hours in a snowbank a few feet from the shore. Greenlaw was found by a resident of the village about 10 below zero. Greenlaw was found shortly after daylight by a resident of the village while on his way to work, the latter being startled by seeing two bare hands protruding from the snow. Removing the snow the man found Greenlaw lying beneath a snowbank. Greenlaw was removed to a nearby house and Dr. John MacKay, of Catalis, summoned. First aid was rendered and Greenlaw was removed later to his home.

LOSERS HANDS AND FEET.

When more thorough examination could be made it was found that Greenlaw's hands and feet were frozen and it was necessary to amputate one hand completely with the exception of the thumb and all the fingers from the other hand. Later part of one foot had to be amputated and all the toes of the other. Dr. MacKay states that only the fact that Greenlaw was clad with heavy clothing saved him from death.

FROST AND LIQUOR.

Dr. MacKay, stated to The Telegram-Journal yesterday that Greenlaw had been drinking an odd amount of liquor, and that he was found in a state of unconsciousness. His condition when found was such that he was unable to move. He was found in a snowbank a few feet from the shore. Greenlaw was found shortly after daylight by a resident of the village while on his way to work, the latter being startled by seeing two bare hands protruding from the snow.
