## ROTHESAY CORPS LEADS SO FAR

Collegiate Cadets Have 279  
Out of 800 Points—City  
Corps Inspected Today.

The Rothsay Collegiate School cadet corps is leading in points scored at the annual inspections of corps now being conducted by Lieut.-Col. A. B. Snow, provincial cadet superintendent, through New Brunswick. This corps made a total of 279 points out of a possible 800, and held first place now in the Strathcona prize contest. Fredericton High School and St. Thomas College are tied for second place with 271 each.

Colonel Snow has inspected the corps at Rothsay College; St. Thomas College; Fredericton High School; Charlotte street school, Fredericton; Woodstock; Moncton; four troops; Sackville and Newcastle. This afternoon he will review the Winter street and King Edward school corps on the Barrack Green, and next week he will inspect the corps at Grand Falls, Perth, Hartland, St. George, the Chatham Grammar school, and the Boys' Catholic Club, Chatham, and the Malville Indian corps. The colonel said this morning that all the troops had made far better showings than last year.

The Rothsay College corps, he said, is better than ever, the boys going through their work remarkably well and the officers having a very close grasp of their duties. The 279 points were made up as follows: March past, 48; company drill, 48; arms drill, 48; extended order, 48; signalling, 48; and physical training, 48.

## THE COURT HOUSE

Montreal Architect Makes  
Suggestion to Municipal  
Committee.

A suggestion which would result in the preservation of the present architecture of the old Court House and at the same time allow the project of a new municipal building on the same site to be carried out was made yesterday by Percy Nobbs of Montreal, architect, at a meeting of a sub-committee of the Municipal Council buildings committee. Mr. Nobbs expressed his keen admiration of the architecture of the front of the building, but was of the opinion that blasting the rock underneath the building to provide a basement would be costly and endanger the structure.

He suggested that the old building might be torn down, the stone pieces in the front numbered and re-erected in their present form to provide a front for one of the smaller buildings that would go to make up the larger structure. In this way the rare architecture would be preserved without interfering with the erection of a modern building.

## WORD OF IT HERE

Norwegian Vice-Consul Notified of Plans for Silver Jubilee of Wilhelmina.

The people of the Netherlands are putting on foot a scheme to fittingly celebrate the silver jubilee of Queen Wilhelmina, which will be held on September 8, twenty-five years since she ascended the throne, and for this purpose are raising funds by subscription. This news was contained in a letter received by Thomas Nagle, vice-consul of the Netherlands here, from W. N. Meen, consul-general in Montreal.

As a token of their love and gratitude to their queen, the Dutch people intend to make a two-fold showing of their appreciation of the way in which they have been governed for the last twenty-five years. Their first object is the restoration of the Choir of the Nieuwe Kerk, in Delft, well known for its association with the Stadtholders and Kings of Holland, and which is greatly in need of repairs. This proposal is said to have met with the entire approval of Queen Wilhelmina. The second object of the people is to make Her Majesty a personal gift of a simple character on her request. Circular letters have been sent to the different representatives of the Netherlands in Canada in order that any of the Dutch people living in this country may have an opportunity of helping in the work of raising the funds. A special committee has been appointed in the home country and the consul-general in Montreal is the representative of that committee in Canada.

## THREE MEMBERS TO BE QUORUM FOR OPENING TENDERS

Resolution Passed by Common Council Today—Conference on Hydro Bill—Expect Word Soon Regarding Magistrate's Retirement.

A resolution, presented by Mayor Fisher by which a quorum at committee meetings of the Common Council would be four members, except at regular meetings when three shall constitute a quorum for the opening of tenders and official papers, was recommended to council at a committee of Common Council this morning. No objection was made by any of the commissioners.

Reporting on the matter of an investigation to determine whether the city was liable to the payment of a bill for \$10,000 for electrical current contracted for with the N. B. Power Commission, the Mayor said that he had requested a conference with the members of the N. B. Commission and had received a reply in which he was informed that the chair would not be in the city for two or three days. When he arrived the council would be notified.

The Mayor said that he had up with the city engineer the matter of the Musquash plant, but no definite decision had been arrived at. Notice that Dr. J. C. Webster of Shediac would be heard at Tuesday's meeting in connection with the placing of historical monuments was given to the members.

The Mayor announced that he had written the Provincial Government regarding the C. P. R. bridge matter at the falls but had not yet received a reply. He also said that there was no reply in the matter of the magistrate's retirement, but that the Government was in session in Fredericton and he was expecting some word on both matters to result.

Mayor Fisher announced that he had a resolution ready on the matter of classification of permanent employees but would not present it until there was a full meeting of the council. The Mayor presided and all the commissioners were present except Mr. Wigmore.

## HONORS IN MUSIC

Grandsons of Robt. A. Johnston  
Win Medals at Alberta  
Musical Festival.

Two sons of Mrs. Wyman, who was formerly Miss Nellie Johnston, daughter of Robert A. Johnston of this city, won distinction at the Alberta Musical Festival in Edmonton last month. William E. Wyman won the gold medal for violin and R. A. Wyman the silver medal for cornet. In its extensive history of the festival, which is a very notable annual event, with contestants from many places in Alberta, the Edmonton Journal of May 16 says:—

"In the cello competition William E. Wyman, of 7224 106th street, gave a very pleasing interpretation of 'Arioso' by John Sebastian Bach, winning high commendation from the adjudicators, who gave him 95 marks. He was the youngest competitor and Mr. Bantock expressed regret that time did not permit the audience hearing him play for a quarter of an hour, as he was sure it would have given everyone great pleasure. The player, he said, showed a natural aptitude for the cello, which he played with deep sympathy. His phrasing was broad and sympathetic and his playing was very effective, in fact was beyond reproach."

"Two competitors, R. A. Wyman and Harry McAnish, of Edmonton, competed in the cornet solo class, the former winning with 90 marks and being commended for his expression and control. The latter contestant was awarded 88 marks. A cornet solo, 'Calvary,' by Rodney, was given by R. A. Wyman, winner of the silver medal for cornet playing. Mrs. Wyman accompanied him on the piano. This was also a thoroughly enjoyable number."

"W. E. Wyman, winner of the gold medal of cello playing, then gave a charming solo."

The same issue of the Journal contains a report of the Sixth Edmonton Boy Scout Troop, written by Bruce Wyman, secretary. St. John friends of Mrs. Wyman will congratulate her on her clever sons.

## Government Will Consider Matter

Hydro Transmission Line From  
Bridgewater, Maine, To  
Woodstock.

Fredericton, N. B., June 14.—Construction of a transmission line from the Maine and New Brunswick Electric Power Company's line at Bridgewater, Maine, down the St. John Valley to Woodstock, so as to supply that district with hydro without waiting until the development of the Grand Falls on the St. John River, was urged by a representative delegation of citizens of Woodstock, Hartland, Florenceville, Bath, Bristol, and other places, upon the Provincial Government yesterday afternoon.

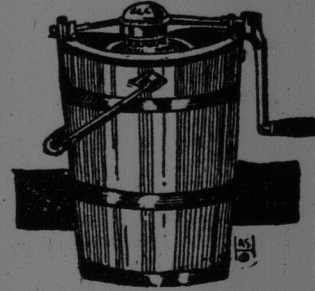
