U. S. STEAMER IS AGROUND OFF THE DANISH COAST

London, Dec. 4.—The United States freight steamer Eastern Tempest, from Hango, Finland, Nov. 27, for Philadelphia, is aground off the Danish coast, according to word received in shipping quarters here yesterday. A salvage steamer has been sent to her assistance. The later reports said the crew had taken to the lifeboats.

The Eastern Tempest is of 4,624 tons gross, built at Seattle this year for the United States Shipping Board. She is being operated by the Globe S. S. Line.

SUES FOR \$5,000; IS AWARDED \$1

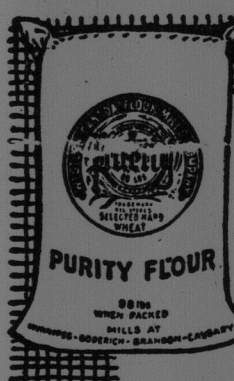
