MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The plant of the J. M. Bateson Wood-working Company in Calgary, was destroyed by fire on Saturday. The loss is estimated at \$80,000, covered by insurance. The building in Main street, Parrboro, occupied by Andrew Sears, was destroyed by fire early yesterday morning. The damage is partly covered.

BLOT OUT THE

PLAQUE SPOTS

Spend \$40,000,000 on Work in Paris

ISLAND OF TUBERCULOSIS

Region Which Swelled Death Rate of French Capital is to Be Made Flourishing With Homes For Workmen

(Times Special Correspondence.)
Paris, Jan. 13.—A start has been made in the work of demolishing one of the worst plague spots in Europe—the infamous "Hill of Tuberculosis," or Island of Tuberculosis, of Paris. On the sites of the most pressing problems. First, the demolition of the old and the substitution of the new buildings are expected to bring down the alarming death-rate of this section of Paris; and, second, they will provide a large population which is too poor to live in any healthy section of the heart of Paris under present conditions, and yet which would be thrown out of employment if compelled to move beyond the "fortifications."

Some months ago the sum of \$40,000,000 was voted for this and other efforts to provide for the poor, especially the poor with large families. In addition to the work now being done to the east of "Les Halles"—the public markets of Paris—a similar district in the neighborhood of the Hotel Dieu and the rue Savarin, will be razed. With the exception of these two spots, however, the rest of Paris will be left to the voracious landlords who are jumping on so rapidly that all except the rich and the middle classes are being driven out. What money is left after the work about "Les Halles" and the Hotel Dieu is completed, will be expended on model workmen's dwellings beyond the "fortifications."

Rapidly's Quarters

The old streets which are thus to disappear have no links with the history of Paris. Much of the land about "Les Halles" belongs to the Rothschild family, who have in the past given generally to the improvement of the conditions of the inhabitants. Years ago they built what were then considered model tenements, but which are today consumptive breeding traps. The deplorable condition is largely due to the class of people who live there. Curiously enough, the majority of them are engaged in one trade—that of rapacious. Those who have visited Paris will be familiar with the type, for both men and women in thousands are to be seen about the streets in the early morning picking over and sorting the refuse of the city before it is removed from the pails and barrels in front of the houses.

It is this indescribably dirty class of men and women who have made the Island of Tuberculosis a district that can be compared only to the worst and most filthy sections of Naples, the dirtiest city in Europe. Leaving "Les Halles" and travelling east, one is immediately assailed by an overpowering odor that successfully keeps the district free of even the most enthusiastic "strollers." Some of the streets are little more than crevices between adjoining rows of old buildings. The rue Trucampois seldom sees a ray of light, even during the brightest days, and the rue Venise is not much more fortunate. The buildings have no running water and boast no sanitary appliances. In the place of these consumption breeding quarters are to be built four and five story buildings with all the modern conveniences. The streets will be widened and courts will be provided in the centre of every block of dwellings. The owners of the land are being asked to provide the ground and the city erect the new houses. When completed, the apartments will rent at from 85¢ to \$100 a year, and preference will be given to workmen and small employers who are burdened with large families.

It was at first urged that \$40,000,000 was not enough money to do all the work necessary, and it was even said by the most enthusiastic that \$200,000,000 would be nearer the mark. At the present moment, however, the disposition is to limit the expenditure to the former amount.
