Toronto, Dec. 8. — Sir Robert Fal-coner, president of Toronto University. defended the action of the university in patenting insulin extract for dia-betes, the discovery of two university professors, on the ground solely that it was done to protect the public and to insure use of the cure at the proper strength.

Intensive laboratory work is being done by Dr. F. G. Banting and his as-sociates to improve the extract.


