London, Nov. 21.—James Gilchrist, superintendent of immigration in New Brunswick, arrived last week and proceeded at once to Cambridge, one of the best districts in England from the viewpoint of his special work. He is now in Scotland, and will in turn visit the principal agricultural counties in England. He will return to St. John in December and will take a party of settlers with him. Great efforts have been made recently by the representative of New Brunswick to extend a knowledge of the opportunities in his province, and these efforts have been made with a considerable measure of success, largely due to the fact that the reports from British people settled within the province during the last few years have been most satisfactory.

The dispensary has been open 138 days during the year and there have been 885 attendances of which 468 were children, and 588 prescriptions were filled, seventy-eight new cases were reported during the year but your committee feel that that is but a small proportion of the cases in the city and that there are many that they are unable to reach and would be glad if anyone knowing of such cases would bring them under the notice of either the staff or the nurse, the latter of whom will always be on duty at the dispensary Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons.

Of the number of cases attending, three—two children and one adult—were discharged as perfectly cured, forty-two as non-tuberculous and there were eleven deaths.

The nurse has made 1486 visits to the homes of the patients as against 1110 last year. More visits are of the greatest importance for it is here that instructions are given the care of the patients and the prevention of the spread of the disease.

Our dispensary is now one of the examining centres for the River Glade Sanatorium and Doctor Townshend is on duty on Thursdays in every month for that purpose.

Any member of the association or other interested in the work, would be a welcome visitor at the dispensary.

Nurse
Miss Sutherland, our present nurse, has proved most efficient and has done a large amount of work and as the dispensary work increases as it has done during the last year there is no doubt that a second nurse will be a necessity.

Funds
With regard to funds our aim is to have 1,000 annual subscribers at \$1 each and at the present time we have only 879. Our collections for the present year fell short some \$200 of last year's amount, being only \$817.50, \$100 of that amount being subscribed by two people. Your committee feel that this is partly due to a misunderstanding regarding tag day fund which is still at interest in the bank and which so far we have been unable to touch but now the matter of building a hospital for incurable cases is in the hands of the municipality, your committee would recommend that this fund be placed in the general fund to be used as necessity requires.

We have also a milk and egg fund which supplies milk and other necessities to those who desire it.

Hospital
We are glad to be able to record that, after considerable agitation and much discussion, since our last meeting a special commission, called the Commission of the St. John County Hospital, has been appointed and is proceeding to build on the site selected. The plans have been prepared by Mr. Brodie under the supervision of Doctor Cox of the Matapan Hospital, Boston, who is an expert on the subject of hospital building. Doctor Cox was in the city in September last and expressed his entire approval of the site and all those who heard him speak at a public meeting on that occasion could not fail to be impressed with his thorough knowledge of the subject.

By this time next year we hope to see a thoroughly up to date hospital, the want of which has greatly hampered the work of this association.

In conclusion, the executive begs to thank the following: dispensary staff, Doctors Kenny, Pratt, Lunney, Loggie and Margaret Parks who have attended so faithfully during the year; the commissioners of the public hospital for the board and lodging of the nurse; the city commissioners for the use of the

LONG DISTANCE TALKING

Reported Wireless Telephone Message Heard Nearly 4,000 Miles

Berlin, Nov. 25.—The transmission of a wireless telephonic communication over a distance of nearly 4,000 miles, from Neustadt - Am - Ruernberg, in Hanover, to New Jersey, was accomplished on October 27 by a German wireless company, according to Rear-Admiral George August Emsmann in a report to the German Shipbuilding Society.

The message was sent and received in the middle of the afternoon in spite of the day being most unfavorable for wireless communications. The two stations are more than 800 feet high. Earlier attempts had proved that clearly enunciated tones were audible, and finally a spoken message was transmitted and distinctly received.
