**WILL CELEBRATE HUN'S DOWNFALL**

Tentative plans were laid down at a meeting held in the mayor's office yesterday afternoon for a big celebration on the occasion of the Germans crying "Nough!" and agreeing to the allied terms of an armistice. Quite a number of representative citizens met the mayor and commissioners and discussed the whole matter and the view was expressed by all that some preparation should be made in view of the indication of an early collapse of the remaining fighting central power.

Mayor Hayes said last night that a festive holiday would be declared that the populace might give themselves over to celebrating in true British fashion.

A committee was appointed at yesterday's meeting to arrange the details of the celebration, with A. O. Skinner named as its chairman, and the other members as follows: Colonel E. T. Sturdee, Commissioner Bullock, Major G. McE. Johnston, Major Victor Heron.

This able committee will be expected to set the stage for the local celebration of the biggest day that the world has ever known and which is coming rapidly and no doubt they will feel their responsibility in the matter.

Mr. Skinner has a tentative plan mapped out. He proposes a mammoth procession headed by a huge float decorated by the flags of the allied nations upon which the mayor and commissioners will ride. This will be followed by another and similar float upon which the military and naval heads of the district will ride. The marshaling of all the returned officers and men and officers and men then on duty here, will be left to the military members of the committee and it is planned that they follow the two leading floats.

That the splendid traditions of the Maritimes may be maintained:—

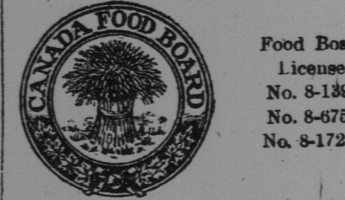
