SENATOR'S QUERIES ABOUT

L. HARRY FLYNN ANSWERED

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—Information was given Senator Flynn yesterday in the senate about J. Harry Flynn, Senator Tanner asked if Flynn, president of the organization commonly called the War Veterans' League, was in the service of the government; his position, salary, if appointed by the civil service commission, his sponsors, and whether a British subject. The reply was that Mr. Flynn was not in the employment of the dominion government, but that he had been employed as a technical instructor by the Soldiers' Aid Commission of Ontario at \$125 a month, and that the term of his employment had expired on October 4. Information was not available as to his allegiance.

POPULAR SUBSCRIPTION FOR LAURIER MONUMENT

Liberal Premiers Are to Organize Provinces and Fund Campaign Will Continue Until Feb. 17

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Laurier Monument Fund plans were perfected yesterday for the erection of a great monument over the grave of the late Liberal chief in Notre Dame Cemetery, Ottawa. The cost is to be defrayed by popular subscriptions by 100,000 in amounts not exceeding \$5. The officers of the monument fund are Hon. Sidney Fisher, chairman; Senator Belcourt, honorary secretary; and P. C. Larkin of Toronto, honorary treasurer.

It was decided to add to the executive, which consists of prominent Liberals living within easy access of the capital, the prime ministers of the eight provinces in which Liberal governments are in power, and Hartley Dewart, Ontario leader.

It was also decided to ask the provincial prime ministers to take charge of the campaign for funds in their provinces and to organize provincial committees. They were requested to complete organization of their committees by November 1, and to have the organization completed by November 20. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's birth day. The campaign for funds will be continued from that date until Feb. 17, the first anniversary of the death of Sir Wilfrid. The headquarters of the executive will be in the Hope Chambers, Ottawa.

CIVIL SERVICE BILL REPORTED TO HOUSE

Amendments of Importance Are Incorporated in Measure

Ottawa, Oct. 9.—The bill to amend the civil service act and to confirm the reclassification of the outside and inside civil service, which has been occupying the attention of a special committee of the commons under the chairmanship of Mr. A. Macleay, was reported last night to the house.

Some amendments of importance drafted by a sub-committee were incorporated. One extends the privilege enjoyed by soldiers in connection with the filling of government vacancies to widows of men who lost their lives at the front or who died as the result of participation in the war.

Another preserves the status of present members of the civil service insofar as increase in salaries to the top of their class is concerned.

A proposal to have the House of Commons staff removed from the jurisdiction of the civil service commission to that of the speaker and the House was not accepted, but this is likely to be further considered. There was considerable opposition in favor of the House of Commons having control of its own officials.

U. S. CROP REPORT

Washington, Oct. 9.—An increase of 42,918,000 bushels of corn and a decrease of 4,074,000 of spring wheat, 6,094,000 bushels of oats, 907,000 bushels of white potatoes and 960,000 pounds of tobacco compared with the forecast of last year were the features of the department of agriculture's report issued yesterday.

Paris, Oct. 8.—Trading on the Bourse today was heavy. Three per cent rentes were quoted at sixty-one francs thirty centimes for cash; exchange on London thirty-five francs forty-two centimes. The quotation on the American dollar was eight francs forty-two centimes.

PROMISES ACTION ON CLOTHING PRICES

Statement by Commissioner Murdoch of Board of Commerce

Convinced That Something Should be Done to Make Articles Cheaper and Hopes for Prompt and Efficacious Action

Toronto, Oct. 9.—Immediate and effective action to regulate clothing prices was forecast by Commissioner Murdoch of the Board of Commerce at the conclusion of the board's investigation into clothing prices here yesterday. Colonel W. H. Price, government counsel, had addressed the commissioners calling attention to evidence which he said warranted action on the part of the board, and Commissioner Murdoch replied:

"I am firmly convinced that something should be done to reduce the price of clothing, and so far as I am concerned as one member I will hope to see something done promptly and effectively, although at the moment I am entirely at a loss nor would it be proper for me to say just in what way or under what conditions or on what order of the board that might be done."

BRINGS BIG SUM IN GERMAN GOLD

Destroyer Arrives With First of \$158,000,000 Berlin Government is to Pay for Food

Half of Sum in London—Shipment Contains Specie Paid on Franco-Prussian Indemnity in 1870

New York, Oct. 9.—The United States destroyer Leuth, known as No. 288, arrived this week from Antwerp and landed \$5,125,000 in German gold at Pier 12, Brooklyn. The specie, packed in iron-clamped wooden cases and guarded by secret service agents under William Karandinsky after the Finance Department of justice, was conveyed in motor lorries to the New York Federal Reserve Bank, 120 Broadway.

This is the first direct shipment of gold from the German government in part payment of the \$185,000,000 for food and supplies of all kinds which was arranged for by President Wilson's administration. The specie was recently in Berlin. One-half of the \$185,000,000 has been shipped from Berlin to London and placed in the Bank of England, which is the London agent for the Federal Reserve Bank.

The gold for the American banks has to be nine-tenths pure against the seven-tenths pure demanded by the English banks. The German specie has to be assayed in London under the direction of the representatives of the Federal Reserve Bank before it is shipped to New York and allocated to the various banks in the United States.

The shipment received yesterday from Antwerp included a quantity of English sovereigns dated 1891 and French Napoleons of the same date which were paid by France to Germany as part of her indemnity after the Franco-Prussian war, and had been kept all these years in the vaults of the Julius Tugan in the town of Spandau. After the war ended a total of \$20,000,000 was taken out and placed in the Reichs Bank, Berlin, and Russian gold coins in the consignment of \$5,125,000 received yesterday in the destroyer Leuth.

DISMISS MAGISTRATES WHO FAVOR SINN FEIN

Belfast, Oct. 9.—Two justices of the peace suspected of having Sinn Fein sympathies have been removed from office in County Fermanagh. This is declared to be the commencement of a general removal of magistrates having such sympathies.

HUGO HAASE SHOT AT REICHTAG DOOR

Berlin, Oct. 9.—(By the Associated Press)—Deputy Hugo Haase, leader of the Independent Socialist party of Germany, was shot and wounded when entering the Reichstag yesterday. His assailant, a native of Vienna, was arrested.
