



Washington, April 20.—Two Cabinet neetings were held yesterday—the first seginning at 11, and last nearly two lours, and the second lasting from here until 5.30 p. m. At their close unnouncement that executive action was delayed until to-day was made. Soth Cabinet esssions were devoted rincipally to discussion of the ultinatum to be sent to Madrid. 
