Comrade A. Zudick, Montreal, sends a yearly subscriber for La Tuque, P. Q. This is in Champlain county represented by P. E. Blondin, Tory. Quebec counties are hard to pierce by an English paper, owing to language difficulties. Little rays of light, however, are working their way in.

Two yearlies from Comrade Mrs. Kate English, Swallowhurst, Alta. This place is in the electoral district of Edmonton and Edmonton sends Frank Oliver to take part in the schemes of Laurier to fasten the rule of the big capitalists yet more firmly on the wage slaves of Canada. But the days of the exploiters draw to a close.

Comrade J. Scott, Woodstock, Ont., forwards three halfers. This is from the electoral district of Oxford North, represented by E. W. Nesbitt, Liberal. Nesbitt wrote to a Socialist last year and said that he would do nothing to stop Lemieux shutting Cotton's from the Canadian mails. Cotton's is being put into his constituency and will eventually deprive him of his political job.

Three yearlies and four halfers is the latest list from Comrade Anders G. Olsen, Webb, Sask. This is in the electoral district of Moosejaw that returns the Liberal W. E. Knowles to Ottawa. Each list of subs from each sub hustler means that the revolution is advancing and that the politicians of the master class will have to give way to the statement of the working class.

Comrade P. C. Pederson, Bergland, Ont., forwards five yearlies from the constituency of Thunder Bay and Rainy River represented at Ottawa by the notorious James Connec. Connec has been bending his energies in grabbing water powers and water privileges of all kinds. He tried to slip a bill through to dam the St. Lawrence in the interests of a private company of American capitalists. Connec is a fit gentleman to be shelved and replaced by a Socialist.

A New Brunswick Comrade has forwarded six yearly subs for St. John, N. B. W. S. Pugsley, Minister of Public Works, elected from this county, may spread himself like a green bay tree and hand out fat juicy government contracts to Liberal heifers whose mouths are watering for the profits that come from working wage slaves ten hours a day and paying them for two hours and a half of the time. But the Socialists are after the scalp of the Hon. Wm., and will get it or that of his successor.

Comrade John J. McKay, New Glasgow, N. S., forwards a subscriber for two years. New Glasgow is situated in Pictou County. Edward Mortimer MacDonald is the M. P. for this constituency. He voted for a navy, for steel bonuses, for railway grants, for the militia that is used to shoot workmen. MacDonald's career has been confined to politics and law. Comrade McKay is endeavoring to confine MacDonald's career in the future to law.

Comrade W. May Jones, Sardis, B. C., takes five half yearly sub cards. Sardis is in the electoral district of New Westminster, which has seen fit to return the Tory, J. D. Taylor, as its member to Ottawa. Taylor serves the capitalists instead of the interests of the workmen. The New Westminster sub hustlers are spreading Cotton's as they wish to pry Taylor loose from his Ottawa seat and place a revolutionary Comrade therein.

Comrade Geo. E. Winkler, Victoria, B. C., forwards one dollar for subs. These subs are all nailed in the political coffin that the Socialists are building for George Henry Barnard, the Tory M. P. for the City of Victoria. Barnard is a lawyer who believes that Canadian workers should be ruled and robbed by capitalists. The Victoria Socialists are working to retire him to the cold shades of private life and replace him by a revolutionary in overalls.

Comrade John O'Hara, Prince Albert, Sask., forwards five halfers. Prince Albert is represented at Ottawa by the Liberal M. P. W. W. Rutta. Comrade O'Hara and the other revolutionaries will make this gentleman see the great light of Socialism, or else will retire him, by the help of Socialist votes in time, to private life where he cannot hold up both hands and yell for capitalist laws that exploit and rob the useful workers of Canada.

"I picked up this halfer on the road to the postoffice." Comrade John E. Lundberg, Lockhart, Alta. Lockhart is in the electoral district of Red Deer that has seen fit to send the Liberal M. P. Michael Clark, to Ottawa. Comrade Lundberg is working in his constituency to persuade the people that capitalism and all its works are evil and that M. Clark is doing evil in supporting the robber system and should be replaced by a Socialist representative. The Socialists are all over Canada and are undermining the power of bourgeois rule. They keep working away knowing that the future is for their philosophy.

Comrade Geo. W. Buck, Norwood Grove, Man., sends a dollar bill for five half-yearly subs. The spread of a Socialist paper is different from the spread of any other kind of a paper. For a Socialist paper is spread by Socialists for political purposes. It is published to bring about a change in society and those who take it do so because they wish to see the change brought about. Norwood Grove is situated in the electoral district of Provencher whose member is the Liberal J. P. Molloy. Comrade Buck is working to send a Socialist to Ottawa and to kill the hopes of Molloy of ever getting back to the legislative halls where he has voted for the slavery of Canadian citizens.

Comrade Ole Paulson, Lamigan, Sask., plunks five subscribers into the voting district of Humboldt, Sask., that is now represented by D. B. Neely, Liberal M. P. Many people think that Socialism is not powerful in Canada, but it is powerful and growing more powerful every day. A Sydney Fisher machine can be seen to work in Broome County. A Wm. Pugsley machine can be seen at work in St. John City and County. But Socialism is at work all over Canada. It is gaining power in every electoral district. It is a pervasive force that will pull down capitalism in a few years' time.

He has been much praised by plutes because he busied himself in trying to get the Canadian government to improve the butcher force and furnish them with more deadly weapons. He is a good man to relieve of his political job to make way for a Socialist.

The Silver Centre Miner's Union take a bundle of ten copies for six months. Silver Centre, Porcupine, Gowganda, are all in the electoral district of Nipissing that is represented by the Tory George Gordon. The mining boys are sick of capitalist rule. Six or seven hundred Cotton's are going into this district and a Socialist member may be returned in the near future. Porcupine has been fire swept and many prospectors perished. The timber was kept standing by order of the Ontario government for the benefit of the big timber capitalists. In Gowganda you cannot cut wood for building without paying some parasite capitalist several dollars a thousand feet simply because the Ontario government has given the capitalists the right to own the timber. Had this not been the case Porcupine would have cut the timber round about and the fire would not have swept over the camp. George Gordon is high in the count of the timber parasites. He is director of the Temagami Lumber Company, the Cache Bay Lumber Company, the A. J. Young Co., the

Convention Call

TRADES AND LABOR CONGRESS OF CANADA.

Office of the Secretary-Treasurer, 112 Florence Street, Ottawa, Ont., July 10th, 1911.

To the Officers and Members of Provincial Federations of Labor, Trades and Labor Councils, Federal Labor Unions and International Local Trades Unions in the Dominion of Canada, Greetings:—

Fellow Labor Unionists and Brothers:—

The Twenty-seventh annual session of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada will convene in Paget Hall, Seventh Avenue, East, Calgary, Province of Alberta, beginning at 10 o'clock, Monday morning, September 11th, 1911, and will continue in session from day to day until the business of the convention has been completed.

This meeting promises to be one of exceptional interest to the organized labor bodies of Canada because of the many important matters that will come before it for consideration. Each year has witnessed a wonderful growth in the intricacy and difficulty of the problems to be dealt with by the congress, and the Calgary convention will be easily first in this respect. Among the subjects to be discussed are the following:—

1. Dominion and Provincial Legislation.
2. The Immigration Laws.
3. The Eight-Hour Bill.
4. Payment of wages on railways, fortnightly.
5. The Winnipeg Street Railway Strike.
6. The Western Coal Miners' difficulty, as well as the strikes in Nova Scotia.
7. The work of the Provincial Federations, notably that of British Columbia.
8. Abolition of Chinese tax and substitution of agreement or understanding, as with Japan.
9. "Imperial" Labor Exchanges.
10. The arrest of McNamara.
11. Non-observance of municipal fair wage clauses.
12. The attempt upon the part of Russia to secure the surrender of Federenko.
13. The judgment of the United States Supreme Court in the Gompers' case.

In addition to these, there are many other matters of vital and every day interest to the workers. It is of the utmost importance, therefore, that every affiliated body should be well represented.

In summoning this convention, your executive council cannot too strongly emphasize the necessity of a large representation of delegates at Calgary. Times are progressing and the labor movement must imbibe some of the freshness and vigor that animate our western brothers. The problems of the movement are becoming more complex and require the best efforts of the best minds.

"If I go to a rich man and tell him he must give me his money or I will make him, they would put me in jail." That is one of the expressions used by an anti-Socialist when talking with a Socialist. It seems so hard to get people to understand that Socialism does not mean unjust robbery. The anti-Socialist who used the above language seemed to think that Socialists wanted to live without work by taking away the incomes of the rich. Socialists do not want such a thing. Supposing a workman works as a track hand on the Canadian Pacific Railway system. He gets \$1.65 a day. For every day he works he gets \$1.65 and for every day he works some capitalist owner gets \$1.65 as profit on his labor. He gets that after all the expenses of management is paid. Socialists hold that if a worker produces \$3.30 he should be paid the full social value of what he earns. He should not be paid one-half in order that some capitalist may get the other half. The capitalist should be made a worker—and should also get what he earns. It is no remedy for anyone to go to the capitalist and say, "Mr. Capitalist. You have much unearned revenue. Give me some of it that I may live at ease also." That would only be changing the person to whom the unjust revenues were going. Socialism does not mean the appropriating of the unearned revenues from the present capitalists and giving them to other idlers. Socialism means the ABOLISHING of unearned revenues, so that the workers may get all they earn.

Many people think that Socialism cannot win because the capitalists can buy the leaders. They point to such men as Burns in England and Briand in France. But Socialism does not rely upon leaders for its success. It relies upon the common people. It teaches people to think for themselves. The so-called leaders are only those men who are elected to power because we have capitalist institutions. When they sell out, the Socialist movement is not sold out. For the common people are still in existence and more and more of them are becoming Socialists every day. Moreover not very many Socialists betray their trust. You do not hear of the hundreds and thousands of faithful Socialist office holders. You only hear of the four or five who turn traitors and are given high office by the capitalists in return. Kings delight to honor these men and the capitalist papers give them much space. They bulk large in print because the capitalists desire to make ignorant people think that all Socialists are of the same nature. How glad the capitalists would be if the Socialists were!

The daily newspapers had an account of how the problem of shopping had been solved. The shoppers went to the stores in their automobiles and took their purchases home with them, thus saving the bother of delivery. The newspapers also carried accounts how to make a nice looking sofa out of a drygoods box at a cost of ninety-eight cents. Putting these two together we would imagine the people drove to the store in their automobile to buy a packing-box and a little cheap cotton cloth and took their purchases home in the tonneau and then spent the rest of the day in making a sofa. But this is not what happens. The rich idlers go and buy their luxuries and travel easily in an automobile to do it. The wives of the wealth producers are informed how to get a sofa, (a very uncomfortable one) for ninety-eight cents. The wealth producers must skimp and save and patch in order that the wealth wasters may live in great pomp and ease. Socialism, you know, is a horrible thing, that would do away with these conditions and allow the wealth producers to live in ease by doing away with the class of wealth wasters.

Socialism causes discontent, stirs up bad feelings between employer and employee. If the Socialists would only stop their agitation, all would be well. This is the kind of argument that many people use when talking about the Socialists. The Socialists cause discontent. But is that any crime? Did not the Christian missionaries in early times cause discontent in Rome? Did not Martin Luther cause discontent? Did not Papineau and Mackenzie cause discontent in Canada? Yes, and out of the missionary movement grew Christianity. Out of the Luther discontent grew Protestantism. Out of the Papineau and Mackenzie discontent grew representative institutions and self rule for the people of Canada. Out of the Socialist discontent will grow industrial democracy and a higher stage of civilization. Discontent is necessary to progress. As long as humanity is contented with old forms of government there is no progress. When mankind is contented with outworn institutions, there is retrogression and decadence. The Socialist discontent is the greatest factor of modern times in the onward sweep of civilization.

Many men are against Socialism. They are against it because they have not read what it means. They have listened to the opinions of men as ignorant as themselves upon the question and they have given ear unto the words of men who have deliberately misrepresented Socialism. Socialism is nothing terrible. It is nothing outrageous. Socialism is a commonsense method of so arranging production and distribution as to do away with poverty, want, overwork, worry, unemployment and vicious idleness. Surely the thing that will abolish these evils is a good thing. If you have been one of those who have been condemning Socialism without knowing what it really means, I would strongly urge you to get some simple books on the question and read up on it. You will find your mind sharpened and the things that now puzzle you will be explained and the reason why they exist made plain to you.
