CULLED FROM THE ORIENTAL MAILS

HAPPENINGS ACROSS THE BROAD PACIFIC

Chapter of Accidents by Sea and Land—Corea in the Grip of the Plague.

The following news paragraphs are culled from Oriental exchanges received by the steamer Athenian, which has just arrived from the Orient.

An Amoy dispatch to the North China Daily News states that of late frequent complaints have been entered at the Amoy Taotai's yamen by merchants and junk owners.

The Shaoching correspondent of the North China Daily News is responsible for the following: "No great events have transpired during the month, but the situation is not very bright in the city and villages."

The damage sustained by the first-class battleship Shikishima by a typhoon, is more serious than was at first supposed.

The N. Y. K. steamer Kaga Maru, which arrived in Yokohama from Seattle on October 25th, had very heavy weather during the trip.
