The town of Jamboil has been occupied and, according to official tele-grams, sacked, with other towns and villages. A gainst this fresh act of aggres-sion on the part of Turkey, Bulgaria has already lodged a protest with the Powers. By carrying a campaign of reconquest from Adrianopie into what cannot possi-bly be laimed as acything but Bulgarian territory, Turkey has created a new situa-tion full of dangerous possibilities. So far as can be judged, the force which has made this incursion is part of the cavalry division which accompanied Envoy Bey to Adrianople, and which has evidently now pushed northward with a speed by no means reckoned by those who im-agined the Ottoman army lacked the necessary mobility and transports for so rapid and so far an advance. When the intelligence of this more by Turkey arrived in London the conference of Ambasadors was still sitting at the Foreign Office, and it is understood that the information caused a feeling akin to consternation.
