"If there is any force in Mr. Blair's argument about the "lean" and the "fat" sections, then there is no justification whatever for taking over that plece of the Canadian Pacific which is the least profitable and almost the costliest. Sir William Van Horne has described the stretch from North Bay to Fort William as a bridge. Little or no freight originates in it. The upkeep costs heavily. The grades are beavy, the curves in many cases short. Freight trains on the section can be little more than one-third the length of those hauled on the best grades. There is no lumber business, for the rivers run away from the road to both north and south. The road cost \$50,000 a mile or more, and the maintenance charges are heavy."
