MIMIC FIREWORKS.

A Brilliant Parlor Display Made With Simple Materials.

Miniature fireworks of a brilliant and beautiful kind can be produced in the parlor with very simple materials, a candle, a clay pipe, and several strips of tin foil. Nor is there the least danger in the experiment to either the person or the furniture. The only precaution necessaray is to spread a sheet of paper over the table on which the candle stands.

Get a number of strips of tin foil such as comes around chocolate and press them closely together. The strips should be about an inch in width. By means of the pipe blow the flame of the candle against the tin foil, and the increase of oxygen thus given to the flame and the corresponding increase of heat will fuse the metal and make it fall to the table in brilliant white globules, which run in radiating lines, if the flame is powerful enough to make the metal melt and burn rapidly, the effect will be very pretty and the light very brilliant. GENEVA, July 1.—A party of Swiss scientists who have been exploring the glacier region of the Canton of Valois have published the following report:

"During the last year the glaciers in the Valois Alps have considerably diminished. The Kawaser glacier has been reduced 26 feet; Beis, 65 feet; Lotchen, and Tigionuovo, 87 feet 9 inches; Allalin, 100 feet 9 inches and Fourtemagne 124 feet 4 inches. Since 1900 the Aletsch glacier—one of the largest in Europe—has shrunk 380 feet 3 inches. Tinal glacier, 334 feet 11 inches and the Grand Desert 604 feet 6 inches.
