Lecture on Gasoline Engines. An interesting and instructive lecture was delivered in the Natural History hall last evening when Professor L. Killam of Mt. Allison University gave an address on the gasoline engine. Professor Killam in opening his address stated that the man who could invent an internal combustion turbine engine would spend the rest of his days on easy street. The speaker then went on to explain the different types gasoline engines to gether with the kinds of fuel and their uses. When speaking of the different types of engines Professor Killam explained the difference between the four cycle and two cycle engines and stated the four cycle was generally used in motor cars because of its ability to turn a higher number of revolutions per minute than the two cycle engine.

The Plumbers Strike. At the meeting of the Plumbers' union last evening it was reported that the firm of J. H. Duddy and F. Campbell had refused to grant the request of their men for a wage of \$3.00 a day, and a strike was declared against these shops. Only six men are involved, and the prospects of securing the increase in these shops were reported to be bright. The Trades and Labor Council and the Building Trades Council have endorsed the demand of the plumbers for more pay, and this means that the other building trades will refuse to work on contracts for the construction of buildings in which non-union men are employed to do the plumbing work. The members of the union are much pleased that the other plumbing firms have granted their request for an increase in pay without inviting a strike. The union is moving to secure regulations such as exist in other cities, providing that plumbers should pass an examination and thus assure first class work.
