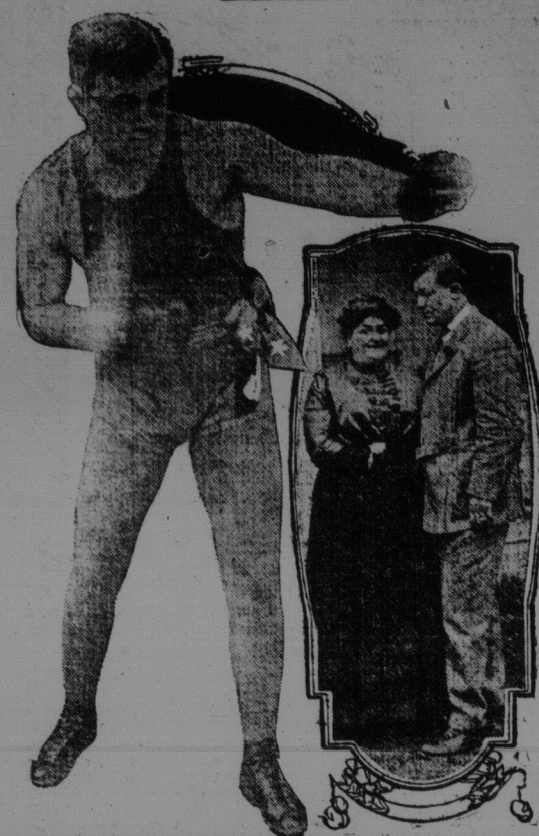


## JIM FLYNN AND HIS MOTHER BOTH BELIEVE HE WILL BE WORLD CHAMP

Flynn is over weight, according to the plans of Manager Curly, who saw to it that his charge took on considerable beef before he started hard work. Curly wants to send Flynn into the ring weighing as close to 200 pounds as he can, and will have him good enough to fight.

Confidence is the middle name of the pretender to Johnson's crown. He is as cocksure as a game cock in a barn yard and actually believes he will be crowned champion of the world July 4, and upset the sporting world, which considers him little chance to defeat the black panther.

Flynn, despite his rough exterior, is a devoted son and his mother lives in a comfortable home in Pueblo, which Jim purchased for her with money he earned fighting Sam Langford.

## INDIAN, "GREATEST AMERICAN ATHLETE," WILL BE OLYMPIC GAME SENSATION

Most spectacular of the American entries in this year's Olympic games at Stockholm is marvelous Jim Thorpe, the Sac and Fox Indian athlete of the Carlisle school, who won the eastern trials. He has been called "the greatest American athlete."

As Martin Sheridan will confine himself to the discus events, Thorpe is expected to win honors which have been won in the past by Sheridan. Strong rivals to Thorpe are Donahue, the coast marvel and August Meant of Chicago university.

Thorpe has shown astonishing form this spring. He is tossing the 16 pound shot well over 45 feet, clearing the bar in the high jump close to 6 feet and doing 22 feet or better in the broad jump. He can step a hundred

yards in 10.15 seconds and the 220 hurdles close to the standard time, while he is one of the best hammer and discus throwers we have. Thorpe has shown exceptional skill with the javelin, is at home in the pole vault and has the hereditary ability of his race as a runner, so will be very much at home in the 1,500 metre run
