**Seventh Olympiad
Swimming Events**
Antwerp, Aug. 6.—(Associated Press)
The complete programme of the
seventh Olympiad to be held at the big new
swimming stadium now under con-
struction here, provides for both day
and night events. Water polo matches are
to conclude each day's programme.

So many nations are expected to
send teams to compete that the Olym-
pic committee have arranged that the
preliminaries in most of the events
shall be conducted in a 500-
yard pool, instead of the 100-meter
pool, to accommodate one day and the
other half later in the week.

The swimming programme, which is
one of the few in which women com-
pete, is expected to draw competi-
tors from most of the famous swim-
mers of Sweden, Australia and
the United States.

For women there are the 100-meter
and 300-meter free swimming races,
two classes of diving events and a 400-
meter relay.

The various events have been as-
signed as follows:
Sunday, Aug. 22.—400-meter free
swimming race, preliminaries; Dives,
5 and 10 meters, first and second
series; 400-meter side stroke; first
round series, one two, three and four;
100-meter free swimming for women;
100-meter swimming on back series,
one, two, three and four; exhibition
of mass swimming, water polo.

Monday, Aug. 23.—5 and 10 meter
diving, first round, third and fourth
series; semi-finals 400-meter free swim-
ming, spring board diving for wo-
men; preliminaries 400 meter side
stroke, first round, series five, six and
seven; semi-finals 100-meter race for
women; 100-meter back swimming,
first round, series, five, six, seven;
water polo.

Tuesday, Aug. 24.—Spring-board di-
ving for men, series one, two and
three; final 400-meter free swimming
race; 100-meter side stroke, first
round, series, one, two, three, four,
five and six; semi-finals, 400-meter
side stroke; finals, 100-meter swim-
ming on back; Pentathlon, 300-meter
race; water polo.

Annual Shoot at Glen Falls Traps

Second Annual Tournament
of St. John Trapshooting
Association Starts Today—
Some Very Prominent Shots
in the City—Good Scores
Expected.

Everything is in readiness for the
big meeting of trapshooters, which
takes place today at the opening of
the second annual tournament of the
St. John Trapshooting Association at
the Glen Falls traps. The committee
in charge have worked hard, there is
a large number of crack shots, and a
splendid collection of cups is being
offered. Among the trapshooters who
are in the city to compete are: F. H.
Morris, of Montreal, and Frank Le-
ment, Halifax, both of the Dominion
Cartridge Co.; Billy Hill, of the Rem-
ington Co.; Bruce Murdoch, of Mon-
treal; C. L. Osborne, winner of the
Montreal Gun Club championship, and
W. B. McIntyre, also of Montreal.

The Nova Scotia men in attendance
are: Brad Smith, winner of the grand
aggregate cup at the Yarmouth shoot-
ing, and Dr. I. M. Leavitt, Yarmouth; Fred
Burrill, secretary of the Yarmouth
Gun Club; John D. McDuffy, Halifax;
Jas. Laughlin, of Halifax; John and
a place on the Canadian Olympic team,
and Fred Magee, of Port Elgin. The
Sydney men will be here today for the
team, and Jas. Egan, O. J. Kilian's
old rival, is expected for the tourna-
ment also.

The tournament opens this morning
at 9 o'clock and continues until 9 p.
m. each day. Today's programme
calls for ten events of fifteen targets
each, with the money divided, two
prizes to each event. There will be
A, B and C classes, also, with a guar-
anteed purse of \$150 and sweepstakes.
High gun in each event wins a silver
spoon, and no competitor can win
more than one spoon in one day.

Tomorrow's programme calls for
five events of twenty targets each,
and A, B and C classes, with a guaran-
teed purse of \$100 and sweepstakes.
The classification is arranged by a com-
mittee picked from the mem-
bers of the St. John club and outside
clubs.

The following special events will be
shot during the meet:
Doubles, twenty pairs of targets.
Two-man team match, open to any
two from any club, with 25 targets
being shot by each man.

Three-man team match, open to only
one team from each club.
Two-man target event. This is a
special challenge match for the Do-
minion Cartridge Company's shield,
between Halifax and St. John, and
will decide the two-man championship
of the Maritime Provinces.

The sixth special is a fifty-target,
two-man match, for the St. John Trap-
shooting Association's shield.
The seventh is a twenty-five target
handicap for a purse of \$25.

There is a special prize for the St.
John Cup for the long run, and to-
day the traps where the shoot will
take place are within easy distance of
the Glen Falls car line, and visitors
are cordially invited to see the shoot.
They can rest assured of seeing
an interesting competition, and
several of the experts in attendance
will give an exhibition of fancy shoot-
ing.

Another large crowd turned out for
