The denominations in the United States have no more claim to be called American Churches "American" in all its applications in the Inited States papers, common speeches, documents, and books. This custom of applying the name of the continent to a country, is not only of no use, but leads to various mistakes. I go into a bookseller's shop, and ask for a map or geography of America.
