TILBURY, March 31.—A meeting has been called for Tuesday, April 12, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to complete arrangements for the organization for the Tri-County Baseball League, taking in all the live baseball centers in Essex, Kent and Lambton Counties. Mayor Odette of Tilbury, who is a baseball enthusiast of the thirty-third degree, and who was last year secretary of the Resex County semi-pro. league, has received many letters from baseball managers in the three counties since the new organization was first proposed, and in consequence of the anceurage—ment he has received, he has called the meeting for April 12, which will be held in Tilbury, as the outside towns agree that this is the most central point, and easily reached by railroad, should the roads not be fit for autos by that date. There is every prospect that at least an eight-team league will be formed, and it is quite probable that twelve will be in the organization. Every town in the three counties that desires fast baseball is invited to send delegates to the meeting. Sarnia reports that they have aiready appointed their delegates. 
