### INTERCHANGE FLAGS.

The Michigan-Ontario Leaguers now are stepping to the front with talk about their interchanges on May 15. In all of the cities there will be elaborate ceremonies to mark the resumption of the sport.

Battle Creek, which has a home opening in which it will be assisted by London, is the first to make preparations. George Black, who had the original South Michigan League club, and who now manages the Post Theatre, has been put in charge of festivities, and will have the co-operation of Colonel Hutchison in charge at Camp Custer.

One of interesting features of the Michigan openings will be an interchange of flags. London has planned to bring to Battle Creek for use on one of the park poles a big Canadian flag and will take home in exchange an American flag, the gift of the Battle Creek club. It is expected similar exchanges will be made by teams that are paired in Michigan cities for opening day. In each of the cities efforts will be made to have a half holiday proclaimed.—A Detroit Summary

Organized baseball's motion for removal of the Baltimore Federal League Club's suit for \$500,000 damages under the Sherman law, in which a jury recently gave a verdict entailing payment of \$240,000, was taken under advisement yesterday by Associate Justice Stafford of the District of Columbia Supreme Court.

Argument of the motion was heard with Justice Stafford, and, however, adherence to his previous ruling that he regarded organized baseball as a monopoly.
