## John Ayeast Borrowed Money From Spotter

PAYS INTEREST ON ALL MONEY STILL IN HIS POSSESSION.

TORONTO, April 17.—Evidence to the effect that Rev. John Ayeast, Chief Inspector of the License Department, had been offered a share of the earnings of two spotters in the employ of the Government, who earned money on the side, but that he had refused to accept it, was made at Wednesday's enquiry at Osgoode Hall. The more important statements in this connection were made by Harry Solomon, who stated that while he and Truman Hinch were working on liquor cases for the department, Mr. Ayeast had made it possible for them to take over work from the Duncan Detective Agency in rounding up C.P.R. conductors who were later convicted of knocking down fares. This work was carried on for several months during the Summer of 1914, and during that time there was \$1,192.70 coming to them from the Duncan Agency. Witness added that he had talked the matter over with Hinch, and both had been willing that Mr. Ayeast should be offered some of the money, because he had "treated them right and had made it possible for them to carry on the C.P.R. investigations at the same time they were doing regular work for the License Department."

A third of their earnings, Solomon added, had been offered to Ayeast, but the latter had refused to accept it. He had, however, borrowed money from Solomon on different occasions, but had always paid interest on it, and had returned it promptly whenever Solomon asked for it. Further, witness stated that Ayeast had taken some of the money to keep for Solomon and Hinch, that he has some of it yet, upon which he is paying interest, and that the amount, with interest, would be around \$400. Under cross-examination from Sir William Meredith, commissioner, Solomon stated that he regarded the money as his, and that he expected to get it any time he asked Mr. Ayeast for it.

A Chance Remark.  
Solomon also fancied he knew how Mr. Hartley Dewar, M.P.P., who made the charges in the Legislature resulting in the Ayeast investigation, had come by the information which made it possible for him to make the charges. Back in 1914, according to witness, Mr. Dewar had taken part in the trial of the C.P.R. conductors, and after it was all over, Mr. Dewar, Solomon and others were in the office of the Duncan Detective Agency.

While there, the question of the \$1,192.70 came up, and Mr. Dewar had asked Solomon what he was going to do with the money. Witness had replied that he would give a third to his partner, Hinch; a third to Mr. Ayeast, and would keep the rest himself.

"Then when I offered it to Mr. Ayeast, he wouldn't take it," Solomon continued.

"But Mr. Ayeast has some of that money yet, according to your own statement," suggested Mr. Robert McKay, appearing for Mr. Dewar. "Whose is it?"

"It is my money, and if I want to, I can give a part of it to Hinch."

"Or to Mr. Ayeast?" Mr. McKay added.

"Or to you, if I want to," witness returned.

## Shot Because He Had Brick House

WHOLESALE MURDERS BY BOL-SHEVIKI ON SLIGHTEST PRETEXT

OMSK Saturday April 19.—Indisputable evidence of the massacre by the Bolshevik of more than 2,000 civilians in and near the town of Osa, has been obtained by Messrs. Simmonds and Emerson and Dr. Rudolph Toulser, of the American Red Cross who have just returned from Perm, Osa and other cities in reoccupied Russian territory. Approximately five hundred persons were killed at Osa and 15,000 in the surrounding district.

Osa which had a population of 10,000 was so denuded of males by the Bolshevik that Gen. Casagrande, upon the occupation of the town was obliged to telegraph to Yekaterinburg for men to administer civil affairs.

The murders were without provocation and the victims were largely of the thrifty and intelligent classes or servants of the church, which latter it was the announced intention of the Bolshevik to exterminate.

## Henry Ford Sells His Motor Stock

Montreal April 18.—The Gazette has received the following dispatch from New York.

The Henry Ford holdings in the Ford Motor Corporation have been acquired or are about to pass to the General Motors Corporation, according to information in high financial circles here to-night. The amount of money involved was not known in Wall street it was said in well-informed circles that it will total many millions.

Control of the Ford Motor Corporation would make the General Motors Corporation the biggest factor in the automobile business in the world. This corporation already manufactures the Cadillac, the Oldsmobile, the Scripps-Booth, the Buick and many other well known motor cars.

Henry Ford resigned as president of the Ford Corporation on December 31, 1918 and his son, Edsel Ford was elected to succeed him at a salary of \$150,000 per annum. After going into the newspaper business Mr. Ford decided that his best field probably lay in the automobile business and recently announced he would manufacture an automobile he would sell for even a more moderate price than did his "flivver".
