## Controversy over eligibility

Last week the Men's Intramural Outdoor Soccer leagues ended with 46 teams and almost 450 men having participated.

The 3 division titles were up for grabs on Thursday but 2 of them were question marks at press time.

In Division 3, SPAT defeated the Wild One 1-0 on the pitch but a number of players apparently played in the Premier Division or Division 1 of the city league and the championship is therefore in question.

M.S.A. defeated the "A" team in the Division 2 Final but again players' eligibility is in question.

Campus Recreation is currently checking out these problems.

Campus Recreation, in its continuing efforts to have something for everyone, has scheduled kayak-polo for its co-recreational intramural program during the month of November. The U of A Paddling Society (a club under Campus Recreation's wing) is supplying the expertise to teach people how to play waterpolo while sitting in a short (stubby) kayak in other words, kayak-polo.

The game was developed by kayaking instructors who wanted to inject some fun into the teaching of basic kayaking skills. A few of them got together and said "Why not play some waterpolo while trying to paddle a kayak?" The idea took hold and, taking a tip from alpine ski instructors who use short skis to teach beginners, the kayakers manufactured short, stubby kayaks which, for obvious reasons, are much more maneuverable than the standard longer kayak. Voila kayak-polo.

A team consists of (2) two women and (2) two men and those interested are reminded that the deadline for entries is at 1:00 p.m. Wednesday, November 4th at the Campus Recreation Green Office. A group must have (8) eight players to register a team.

After over 500 men played 138 games of flag-football, COMPUTING SCIENCE, PHARMACY I, and the SCHWILLERS emerged as Division 3, 2 and 1 Champions respectively on Saturday October 24th, at the Jester Hall Fields.

latter stages. The SCHWILLERS took FORESTRY in a 21-14 barn-burner and captured the Division 1 title, because of eligibility problems. In Division 1, Kappa Sigma defeated the Salt Shakers 2-0 and repeat as the Division 1 Champs.
