of land of which they now hold posses-

Throughout the greater portion of this I rovince the Indians are, and will be for many years to come, completely isolated, having lettle or no intercourse with the whites, and in these remote places no difficulties are likely to be experienced. It will therefore be apparent to you that should the present elaborate and cumber-- some mode of dealing with the Indian lands be continued, until the entire num. ber and extent of the reserves throughout the I rounce be determined and appropriated, many years will necessarily, elapse before the work can be completed, whilst the cost to both Governments must be excessive, and entirely disproportionate to the results attained.

For thise reasons I consider the actions of the presents Commissioners should be restricted to the set blement of aifficulties in the places referred to. All existing difficulties could be adjusted, and the Commission dissolved towards the close of the present year, should this sugges-

tion be adopted.
