

- Q How shortly after ?

- Q And do you know whether the parcels were delivered ?

- Q And one of them went to the Camp Commander ?
- A That is true, Sir.
- Q I think that you were aware, Sergeant-Major, that certain members in the Camp maintained a daily diary ?
- A There is only one man to my knowledge, Sir, that kept a diary.
- Q And he kept a daily diary ?
- A No, Sir, this man did not keep a daily diary. He kept a record of some of the food in the Camp.
- Q A daily record ?
- A Yes, Sir.
- Q As a matter of fact you were concerned in that diary at one time ?
- A I was somewhat, Sir.
- Q I think that possibly he lost the diary and you got it back or helped him get it back ?
- A Something like that, Sir.
- Q Did you ever see the diary ?
- A Not to have a good look at it, Sir. I believe it was written on blue paper in pencil. It was not a book actually. It was just a sheet of paper.
- Q Do you know of the information he put in it ?
- A Yes, Sir. I believe he had just the food issued daily to the prisoners of war.
