- How many could you name? Quite a lot of them. Q.

- Not the whole 30. I took the names of the ones left and turned the list into the Orderly Room. A .
- Q. How did you know the accused was one of the 30?
- A. I seen him.
- Q. How did you recognize him?
- A . They pushed right past me.
- Did they .run past you? Q.
- A. Some ran
- Q. Did the accused run?
- I don't recall. A.
- Would it be fair to say that if they ran past you you would only get a fleeting glance of them?

 No, I saw them perfectly well. Q.

- Fairly well. You did you checked? Not the exact number. You did not know the exact number until Q.

- You didn't know just who went out?
- I knew a number of them. I didn't know them all After working in the hot for 3 or 4 months you get used to A . their names and faces.
- Q. How were you so sure that the accused was one of the 30?
 - He went out of the hut, he must have gone past me.
- There are windows in the hut aren't there? Yes, but there are bars on those windows.
- Q. You say that on the 9th May you saw the accused again?
- That's correct sir. A.
- Q. Where abouts?
- A. In front of #6 Cell Block
- Q. Where were you standing when you saw this?
- Along between 4 & 5 Cell Blocks. A.
- WEre you in the passageway?
 - right in the corner between the two Cell Blocks.
- Q. I don't see a corner there?
