QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS. Miscellaneous.

STALLION'S NUMBERS.

Would you give us the number of
 Prince Stanley, bred by W. M. Faulds, of
 Muncey, and of Red Cross Knight, bred
 by Mr. Scott, of Ilderton? Both are

Ans.—Prince Stanley [3227]. We have
 failed to find Red Cross Knight in the
 books. Possibly Mr. Henry Wade, To-
 ronto, may furnish the information.

GREEN BASSWOOD LATH.

How would green basswood do for
 lathing a house? J. C.

Ans.—The opinions of the practical men
 to whom this question was referred, did
 not favor the use of green or even sea-
 soned basswood lath, though none of
 them, nor any of our staff have ever seen
 it used for this purpose. Possibly some
 reader has tried it.

TO THICKEN A THIN STAND OF CLOVER.

I have a field on which oats was grown
 and grass seeded last year, but there is
 barely half a take of clover there. Would
 you advise me to light harrow, sow more
 seeds, then roll firmly? Field is in
 good heart and clean. CLOVER.

Ans.—We would have preferred sowing
 on snow in March, so that the seed
 might settle early into moist honey-
 combed soil. Now it will probably be
 well to sow as you suggest, if soil is
 light; if heavy, sow seed first, and then
 harrow, keeping roller off the land. A
 weeder might prove serviceable in cover-
 ing the seed sown on harrowed ground.
 Sow a mixture of red clover, 4 lbs.; al-
 sike, 2 lbs. Five or six pounds of the
 mixture per acre on the thin spots.

SOAP-VINEGAR

1. What can be added to good lye from
 hardwood ashes and good soap grease
 that will make homemade hard soap
 more effectual? Would borax, ammonia,
 soda or chloride of lime added to the
 boiling soap be beneficial?

2. Could you give me a recipe for good
 homemade vinegar where it is impossible
 to obtain cider? REX.

Ans.—1. The expert to whom this ques-
 tion was referred doubted the efficacy of
 any such ingredients, and cautioned
 against the use of chloride of lime.

2. Excellent vinegar may be made from
 maple sap. We have often used the late
 run, that remaining in the buckets when
 they were gathered. Prepare as cider
 vinegar.

MILL FEEDS FOR COWS IN SUMMER.

Would it pay to feed cows bran through
 the summer for making butter or selling
 cream? Would it pay to feed right
 along through May and June, and how
 much? M. E. K.

Ans.—Not if pasture is good. If pas-
 ture is likely to be insufficient, provide
 soiling crops as suggested in this and
 previous issues. Economy considered,
 nothing can beat a bellyful of good rich
 green food for milk or beef production.
 Lacking this, from 2 to 4 lbs. per day of
 mixed bran and shorts, with 1 or 2 lb. of
 cotton-seed meal, will keep up a milk flow
 and add materially to the value of the
 manure. If pasture is not good or fails,
 owing to douth, it will pay to feed ex-
 tra, as if the milk flow is checked, it is
 hardly possible to bring it up to the
 standard again in the season.

SOWING CLOVER AND KINDS OF CLOVER FOR CLAY SOIL.

1. What is the best way to cure clover
 hay?
 2. What is the best kind to sow on a
 heavy clay soil?
 3. Would it be profitable to sow on a
 meadow that had been seeded with timothy
 last spring? E. C.

Ans.—1. Clover curing has been fre-
 quently discussed in these columns, and
 will be treated again in season.

2. We would suggest red clover, 5 lbs.;
 alsike, 3 lbs.; white clover, 1 lb. The
 latter will be good for pasture the
 second year. With the above mixture use
 4 or 5 lbs. timothy if the land is to be
 left more than one year in grass. We
 consider red clover the very best kind,
 but alsike will sometimes grow where red
 clover will not, especially on clay.

3. Not unless the timothy had failed in
 spots. Even then, the wisdom of sow-
 ing clover seed, would be questionable.
 If sown, it should be covered lightly. A
 weeder would be the implement to use.
