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" each department, confidered as a fundamental maxim—uni-" verfally to regulate our proceedings by those models only " which had been fanctioned, in fimilar cases, by the practice " of the Parent State; and, in cases peculiar to our local fitu-" ation, or to the fubordinate condition of a province, to de-" viate from those venerable rules no further than necessfity " should require. To this maxim I take the present occasion " of recalling your attention, and of recommending it to your " steady purfuit in all your future deliberations.

"The principal bufine's which, at this time, requires dif-"patch (after what concerns the provincial revenue) is the continuation or renewal, perhaps with fome amendments, of fuch temporary laws as have been found to be of real uti-"lity, and may be near expiring.

"GENTLEMEN of the Assembly,

" I have directed the necessary papers and accounts, together with the estimates for the year enfuing, to be laid before you.

"A plan of a fuitable building, for the decent accommodation of the General Affembly and the Courts of Juffice, and for which a convenient fituation in the *Town* of *Frederiction* has been allotted, was recommended to the confideration of the late Houfe of Affembly; to whom alfo I fuggefted the importance of making fome annual allowance in fupport of a Provincial Seminary of Learning, of which a foundation had been laid by an allotment of lands adjacent to this Town, but which cannot, for many years to come, be fufficiently productive to anfwer the exigencies of fuch an inflitution; and I earneftly recommend it to you, as a bufinefs that calls for your immediate attention, to make effectual provision for both these objects, which are of fuch evident importance.

"GENTLEMEN of the Council,

" And GENTLEMEN of the Assembly,

"The people, of whom this rifing colony is composed, have, under the most trying circumstances, given signal proofs of unshaken loyalty and a just estimation of the peculiar blessings which they inherit under the British Government and "Constitution. To them, therefore, it must be a subject of "exultation,
