PEACE RUMORS AFFECT BERLIN STOCK MARKET

Shares of War Material Manufacturers Less Attractive Than Formerly.

London, Nov. 4.—Peace rumors and the mysterious journeys of Dr. W. S. Solf, German Secretary of State for the colonies to The Hague and Prince Von Buelow to Switzerland, are having effect on the Berlin Stock Exchange.

This reports a change on the Berlin Bourse, where the shares in companies engaged in the manufacture of war materials have become less attractive than formerly. Speculators are now directing their attention to industrial and other securities which are likely to come into request with the resumption of German foreign trade and the securities of international character which might profit by international agreements.

The Frankfurter Zeitung, however, warns speculators against being misled by baseless rumors.

ACCIDENT NOT SERIOUS

So Says London Lancet in regard to King's Fall From Horse.

London, Nov. 3.—The Lancet says it is in a position to state with authority that the accident to King George resulted in severe shock, much bruising and pain.

"But there has been no more serious outcome to his dangerous mishap," adds the Lancet. "There is no evidence whatever of any visceral lesion or any fracture. Although his Majesty is still confined to bed, this is necessitated solely by muscular stiffness following the bruising."

ATTITUDE OF RUSSIAN FOREIGN OFFICE TO PAPERS

Petrograd, Nov. 3, via London Nov. 4.—The Foreign Office has authorized the following statement:

"The fact that some Russian newspapers are adopting a critical attitude toward the Foreign Office may possibly be given undue importance abroad by persons who assume that Russian newspapers are necessarily either inspired or under narrow restrictions. Neither is true.

"The Foreign Office exercises the right of offering gratuitous suggestions unless the interests of the state require a cautious attitude by the newspapers toward current questions.

"The Foreign Office assumes that an institution or a man that is not talked about is not worth talking about. Criticism is free and not repressed though sometimes it is unfair. It actually and naturally foreshows the trend of Turkish policy, but not hunting for additional enemies determined the outbreak of the war as long as possible. The history of the recent Russo-Bulgarian relations is somewhat similar.

"The foreign office saw a year ago that Bulgaria probably would ally herself with Germany and Austria. It tried to prevent this happening, and, when it became inevitable, to defend the breach. This policy became impossible only when Russia invited German and Austrian officers into the staffs of its armies."

STRATEGIC CALM ALONG ENTIRE RUSSIAN FRONT

Germans Everywhere Preparing for Winter and Constructing Trenches.

Petrograd via London, Nov. 4.—Col. Shumsky, military critic of the bourse gazette, telegraphing from Russian headquarters, says strategic calm has set in along the entire Russian front, and that the Teutons compelled to suspend their aggressive operations, are every where preparing for a possible campaign in their preparations for the present line. "The enemy," Col. Shumsky adds, "is constructing an elaborate system of trenches and fitting them with stoves and other wise protecting them against the Russian winter. Meanwhile his rear is being organized with feverish activity. Roads are being repaired or built, permanent railways restored, field lines laid down, bridges rebuilt with their faces to the east."

Col. Shumsky thinks that instead of there being any danger for Riga and Dvinsk the German positions on those fronts are more unfavorable than elsewhere.

agreed, with Lord Selbourne, when he spoke of the stupidity of the censor's actions. Everything which made the enemy think the country was afraid of the truth was an encouragement to the enemy.

Lord Morley deplored the effect on neutrals of "the ostrich-like activities and childish insincerity" of the censorship and added that he had never seen a government or an administration less in need of a censor press than the present one. He had never been addicted to undue glorification of the infallibility of public opinion, but it was not half as fallible as the opinion of monarchs and ministers, even Prime Ministers. They leaned on public opinion, good or bad, and how in the world were they to lean on free, full and correct public opinion unless the public had free, full facts on which that opinion rested.
