The bulk of the world's supply of paper is made from spruce and oth-er soft woods, the supplies of which are staadily diminishing. The quan-tities of soft woods available within the Empire are comparatively small, and so it has come about that the Empire is largely dependent on for-eign countries, especially Scandi-navia, for its supplies of paper or the wood pulp from which it is made, the chief source of supply within the Empire being Newfoundiand and Canada. The Imperial Institute has therefore given special attention to the possible substitutes for wood which are to be found in the grasses growing in tropical and sub-tropical countries.
