### LOCAL NEWS.

Municipal Council meets for transaction of business on Saturday next. It is reported that John Wiltse Esq will rent his farms in the spring and move into the village.

A report of the A. O. U. W. oyster supper and entertainment at Toledo is unavoidably crowded out.

Mrs. Wm. Mott has removed her Millinery and fancy goods to the flat over Mr. Mott's grocery store.

The next meeting of the Farmersville Branch of the Bible Society will be held in the Presbyterian Church.

A collection was taken up in the Methodist Church on Sunday evening in aid of the Kingston General Hospital.

The name of Mr. F. L. Moore was inadvertently omitted from the published list of Directors of the Brockville Farmers' Institute.

Mr. F. L. Kineaid, of Brockville, intends to erect a fine cottage at Charleston Lake, on the site of the one destroyed by fire last summer.

Miss Sarah Byers lost a valuable old gold earring, with gem stones, five weeks ago, either on main or Victoria Streets. A liberal reward will be given for its recovery.

Owen Heiferton, late of Charleston, died on the first inst., at the age of 65. The funeral, on Friday, was very largely attended by the friends and neighbors of the deceased.

Geo. W. Greene has removed his law office from over Beach's store to the building next to P. Wiltse's store, a millinery and fancy goods shop.

Parties requiring salettes or mantle cloths of any kind would do well to see Lewis and Patterson's stock at 205 King St., Brockville. Winter goods of all kinds are selling fast at the present prices.

The Station house and freight shed for this village were commenced on Monday, January 30th and are being pushed forward as fast as a large gang of hands can rush it. The timbers for the water tank are also on the ground.

Our thanks are due to Mr. Charlie Fisher, of Mississippi, for a splendid photographic view of the Mine-Trestle, the scene of the recent dreadful accident on the C. P. R. Charlie writes that he is well, and sends regards to all Farmersville friends. His letter concludes with the following paragraph: "We have been having lots of cold weather and snow, causing some bad blockades. Mercury dropped to 50 below zero. How is the B. & W. Railway prospering? I suppose the next time I go home I can ride from Brockville by rail. I am glad to hear occasionally that they are making some progress with the road."

A meeting of the directors of the Mechanics' Institute was held at the office of G. W. Greene last evening, when the by-laws, rules and regulations were taken up *seriatim* and passed. It was decided to organize a night school if a sufficient number of pupils could be secured. The school will be held on the premises of one of the high school rooms at the disposal of the Institute, and the teachers in the high and public schools have offered their services free. The tuition fee and government grant will be applied to the purchase of books for the library. Any information can be obtained from any of the officers of the Institute. A meeting of all those interested in the Institute and the formation of a night school will be held in the high school building on Friday evening at 8 o'clock.

## LEADS AND GREENVILLE.

First Session of the Council of the United Counties for 1888.

THURSDAY. The report of the special committee on the petition of Augustus, praying for a grant to a desistate imbecile was referred to a committee of the whole, and finally no action was taken.

The Other Creek bridge matter was referred to the Committee on Roads and Bridges.

Misses Trill, Saunders and Jolly were appointed a committee to confer with Brockville and Prescott as to the amounts to be paid by those municipalities for the administration of justice for the five years 1884-8.

The County Property Committee reported that there were three lunatics in the jail, and recommended that they be sent to the asylum. They had received from the County of Wilkesd and prizes, and recommended no action. They also recommended that the chairman make enquiries as to cost of new shelving for registry office.

The report was adopted.

Mr. Ferguson moved for the appointment of a committee to assess personal property, and recommended that the Government be petitioned to abolish assessments on live stock. The report was referred to a committee of the whole.

Mr. W. Richardson spoke in favor of the exemption of live stock, and Mr. McCrae followed to the same effect.

Mr. Carmichael thought there were just about enough exemptions, as the farmers' live stock.

Mr. Hughes agreed with Mr. Carmichael.

Mr. Riddell thought the present system unfair, as the farmer with a poor farm, who was obliged to raise stock, was assessed for this stock, while the owner of the better farm, which produced grain, escaped.

Mr. Connolly said that this was true, the grain farm was assessed for more than the stock farm, which equalized matters.

Mr. Dailey agreed with the utterances of the former speaker, and thought the question rested itself in the abolition of all personal assessments.

Mr. Richardson thought no exemptions should be made.

Mr. Berney spoke in favor of exempting live stock.

Mr. Ferguson and Mr. McCrae also expressed themselves in favor of it.

The clause referring to exemption of live stock was finally adopted.

Mr. Connolly, seconded by Mr. Anderson, moved for a resolution memorializing the Government to make it imperative upon county councils to erect houses of refuge for the indigent and those temporarily insane. The motion was lost.

A deputation from the bench and bar waited upon the Council, and asked for additional accommodations in the Brockville Court House, and for the appointment of an official stenographer for the County Court. Committees were appointed to consider the matter.

FRIDAY. The Committee on the Other Creek bridge reported unfavorably as to putting up a new bridge in sections, as proposed by Rev. J. E. Saunders, and a grant of \$50 for replanking, or a through suspension. The report was adopted, and Mr. B. J. Saunders was appointed to inspect and report at June session.

Grants of \$50 each were voted to the Farmers' Institutes of South Leeds, Brockville and South Grenville.

The Committee on Education recommended the appointment of G. W. Bishop, Brockville, as the following High School Trustees: Arza Parish and Horace Brown; Kempville, Thomas Johnston. The report also recommended a grant of \$200 each to the school inspectors, for travelling expenses.

The first clause of the report was adopted, but Mr. Jolly moved that the inspectors receive only \$150 for travelling expenses.

Mr. W. Richardson thought the inspectors were poorly paid, and favored the adoption of the committee's report.

Mr. Beecher said he thought the smaller amount ample.

Mr. Saunders said the committee had gone very carefully into the matter, and had recommended \$200, while at the same time they thought the actual expenses were more than that sum.

Mr. McInlyre, another member of the committee, spoke to the same effect.

The committee on the appointment of a shorthand reporter recommended the appointment of J. E. Saunders, and Mr. Jolly moved that he be called upon to contribute more than \$25 towards the salary. The report was adopted.

The second report of the Finance committee, enumerating accounts and special grants, was adopted.

A motion was carried authorizing the committee on improvements to employ an architect, secure plans, and advertise for tenders for the work, and to report at the June session. A motion was passed authorizing the treasurer to pay the Times Printing Co. 75 per cent of the printing contract at the time the work was actually done.
