Your correspondent had the pleasure of visiting Mr. C. H. Smith's cheese and butter factory at Chantry on April 1st, and found our genial proprietor at his post of duty, and as usual ready to impart any information concerning this most important industry.

I was more than pleased to be shown through the entire establishment, which of itself is certainly a credit to any county, and I am sure the farming community around Chantry and vicinity feel justly proud to know that in Mr. Smith they have a man of such enterprising spirit—a man who commenced his labors in this industry when very young and has steadily climbed the ladder of success until he now occupies one of the foremost positions as a dairyman in this fair Canada of ours.

When we entered the place we were received into a room, 12x30 feet, used as a tool room, pump room and general store room. We then stepped into a room 22x30 feet, filled up with the most modern appliances for making fancy butter, which speaks for itself in every appearance of neatness. We then passed through the boiler and engine room, which is used for the purpose of raising steam and for heating the water.

There we found a room 30 feet square with three large vats and presses for 25 cheese, all nicely fitted up. Then we passed into the curdling room, which has a special arrangement for the addition of new model tables for holding cheese, which certainly speaks highly of the taste of our genial proprietor. This room is 20x30. Then we visited last, but not least, a new addition of this season, known as a box and string room, 12x30, from which the cheese is loaded onto the farmers' wagons. The whole above mentioned departments are all on a level, from one room to another, which certainly is an advantage to those who are engaged in making the butter and cheese.

The outside of the building also presents a fine appearance, being nicely coated with paint. Upon enquiry, I found that as high as twelve to thirteen thousand pounds of milk has been received in one day at the butter factory, and an average of twenty-two decimal fifteen (22.15) pounds of milk made a pound of butter during the month of December, and about three decimal four-five (28.45) pounds of milk to a pound of butter during January and February. This, no doubt, will interest those of our readers who are personally identified with the dairying industry. I was also informed that the price realized for each pound of butter was from 18 1/2 to 19 cents, and when we stop to think that farmers' butter would only bring from 12 to 15 cents per pound, we readily see the advantage of a winter creamery.

The debate on the address in the Dominion House of Commons has been postponed until the following day, Tuesday, April 13th, on account of the illness of the Opposition member, the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie.

At a caucus of the Opposition members of the Manitoba Legislature held at the residence of the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie, a resolution was passed to present a memorial to the Government with respect to the proposed amendments to the Dominion House of Commons bill last session.

Another Canadian Victory.

Last December Messrs. C. J. Gilroy & Son had part of their famous Holstein herd tested officially for seven days' butter production. They entered these cows in competition with the oldest, wealthiest, and best breeders in the United States.

The Holstein Friesian Association of America offered \$1250.00 in 43 prizes, as follows: First prize, \$50.00 for the cow having the highest official record of butter for seven days, each succeeding prize one dollar less, ending in 43rd prize of \$8.00.

Messrs. Gilroy & Son had the first and only Canadian cow entered for the seven days and drew the 19th prize, Inka Sylvia, a two year old heifer. This heifer is the only daughter of their celebrated dairy test winning cow, Carmel Sylvia. Their 3rd entry was Midge Inka, a two year old, drawing 17 lbs. in seven days, drawing 31st prize, making a total of \$79 for the three entries.

It might be stated that it is so arranged that no firm or breeder can draw more than three prizes, and for this reason the Maple Glen Herd of already famous black and whites sent forward only three entries.
