If This Were Done he Says the Minis ters Would be Given up.

Washington, Aug. 2.-The State department has made public the followng correspondence between Li Hung Chang and the department, regarding the abandonment of the campaign in

Telegram sent to the United States embassies in Berlin, London, Paris, Rome, and St Petersburg, and to the United States minister, Tokio:

Department of State, Washington, Aug. 1.-In reply to a suggestion of Li Hung Chang that the ministers might be sent under safe escort to Tien Tsin provided the powers would engage not to march on Pekin, the secretary of state replied on the 30th of July:

"This government will not enter in to any arrangement regarding disposition or treatment of legations without first draving free communication with Minister Conger. Responsibility for their protection rests upon Chinese government. Power to deliver at Tien Tsin presupposes power to protect and to open communication. How the Allies Treat the Wound ed Chinese Soldiers.

A German Officer says it is Neces sary to Kill all who Fall Into Their Hands.

Seattle, Wn., August 2 .- Special to the Times from Victoria, B. C., says: Lieut Von Krohn, of the German army, arrived at Yokohama in company with 300 wounded and incapacitated Germans and others on the Str. Korn, chartered by the German government just before the Glenogle sailed, told his experience with Admiral Seymour in his attempt to reach Pekin. Asked what the Chinese did with their women and old men, Lieut. Von Krohn said they emigrated with all speed, but if this were not possible, as in the case of one village, taken by the allies, they cut off the heads of the

women and children and threw them into the river. "We did not take prisoners," said Lieut. Krohn, "as far as the capture of prisoners is conterned. That was an impossibility, as the Chinese are not civilized for that kind of warfare." Lieut. Krohn was asked about the statement of a German that the Russians had dispatched the wounded with the butts of their rifles. The heutenant said it was not quite so bad as that, but under the circumstances in the present war in China they had been and probably would in the future be compelled to kill wounded prisoners with the bayonet. In the beginning they had even sent wounded prisoners to the hospitals in Tien Tan, but they soon found that as long as a man was table to raise a band be would try to able to raise a hand he would try to stab the foreigners. Frequently they found Boxers who had taken their red badges and clothes off in the hope of trying to "amigo" trick, and while the trick worked at first, the allies soon gave orders to kill every Chinese who

would stand. Lieut. Von. Krehn said the Chines scapitate and mutilate every foreign er who is unfortunate enough to fall into their hands. On one occasion a large number of Boxers succeeded in enclirching an Italian officer with eight men, and while four of the men cut their way through, the other four and the officer were simply hacked to
